TAX RELIEF FORMS DUE APRIL 1

Both the Town of Vienna and Fairfax County offer real estate tax relief for low-income homeowners who are 65 years old and over, or permanently and totally disabled. Total household income and total combined assets requirements must be met, and both Town and County applications must be filed.

Applications for 2011 for all programs are due April 1. This date may be extended to December 31 of next year for first-time filers or if hardship conditions exist which, through no fault of the applicant, prohibit applying by April 1. FY 2011-2012 BUDGET SCHEDULE

Copies of the proposed Town budget for fiscal year 2011-2012 will be available for public review beginning Monday, April 4, in the Administrative Services Office at Town Hall and at Patrick Henry Library. Town Council budget work sessions are scheduled at Town Hall on Saturday, April 9, at 1100 a.m.; Monday, April 11, at 7:30 p.m.; and Tuesday, April 19, at 7:30 p.m. Work sessions are open for the public to attend. A public hearing on the proposed budget is scheduled for the May 9 Council meeting and a hearing on the proposed tax rate June 6.

COUNTY BUDGET HEARINGS SET

Public hearings on Fairfax County's fiscal year 2011-2012 budget have been set for 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 29, and Wednesday and Thursday, March 30 and 31, at 3 p.m. Those wishing to speak should contact the Office of the Clerk to the Board at 703-324-3151 or sign up online at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/bosclerk/speaker_bos.htm. In addition, the public is encouraged to share their thoughts on the budget online or through the budget hotline, 703-324-9400.

Fairfax County Executive Anthony Griffin has proposed a General Fund budget of \$3,376,351,675 for FY 2012, an increase of \$68,232,761 or 2.06% from this year. The proposed budget maintains the current tax rate of \$1.09 per \$100 of assessed value.

The County Executive's proposed budget includes agency budget reductions totalling \$9.5 million. These reductions, which impact most County agencies, do not result in significant program reductions but require agencies to hold positions vacant longer, to not fill some key position vacancies and to maintain work and service levels within reduced resource levels.

The proposed FY 2012 Budget will be considered for adoption at the April 26 Board of Supervisors Meeting.

PROPOSED NOISE ORDINANCE UPDATE

At the March 7 Town Council meeting, Council voted to move forward with the changes to the ordinance as proposed. Town Council will formally vote on the proposed changes at the April 4 Town Council meeting, with an effective date of April 14. In summary the changes to the Town's Noise Ordinance include:

- delaying the start time for commercial deliveries and commercial trash pickups near residences to 8 a.m. on Sundays and six Federal holidays (New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas);
- prohibiting commercial yard service on Sundays;
- prohibiting home construction contractor work AND commercial yard services on the six Federal holidays mentioned previously; and
- changing the start time from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. for property owners to perform work on their property on Sundays and the above listed six Federal holidays.

The ordinance will continue to prohibit home construction contractor work on Sundays (this is in the Town's current noise ordinance.)

ABSENTEE VOTING

If you will be out of town on election day or are unable to go to the polls because of illness or disability, you may vote by absentee ballot in person or by mail. In-person absentee voting will be conducted at the Fairfax County Government Center on weekdays from March 18 through April 29, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturday, April 30, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. April 30 is the last day to vote absentee in person.

The deadline to apply for an absentee ballot by mail is April 26, at 5 p.m., and ballots must be received in the office of Elections by 7 p.m. on election day in order to be counted.

As a Town citizen, along with other citizens that I talk to, we are tired of seeing our town run like a private club. Spending millions on a park for Presbyterian Church, especially during this difficult economic time does not look good on Town Council's resume.

Last year, Town Council presented sidewalk improvements with estimated price tags of over \$16 million (\$185 per linear foot, \$340 including curb and gutter, \$738 per LF if drainage and street improvements needed). I wonder how they came up with these numbers and how many contractors bid on these projects.

It should be recognized that many of the federal and state provided funding to local municipalities are based on a formula or set allocation. Use of this federal fund for sidewalk improvements (which we need on most streets) might alter the typical use of those funds, which could result in other projects or programs going unfunded. Another way is to require developers to install sidewalks as part of their developments.

If elected for Town Council, I would like to look carefully at projects and programs in town and their priorities, talk to our citizens, not just a few in the town meetings but the other residents who could not attend the meeting to hear their opinion on the subjects.

Thanks to our police department for their wonderful work, but I would like to have an opportunity to talk about PD, PD projects and our safety in town. Thank you and God Bless.

SCAM UPDATE FROM THE VIENNA POLICE DEPARTMENT

As the Vienna Police Department learns of new scams and criminal methods that are being used in an attempt to swindle our residents, we will continuously publicize them in an effort to thwart such activities.

- A person comes to a home and says that they need money for an automobile repair or tow. They go on to purport themselves to be a relative of a neighbor or some other individual which would link them to the area. They may even be overly courteous and appear sincere. Once they receive the money, they disappear as there is truly no emergency and they are not related to anyone in the immediate area.
- A subject comes to a home and tells the elderly homeowner that he is there to collect his money for some work which he had previously performed. As some elderly folks might be too trusting and believe they simply

forgot about the work, they pay him. In one case the homeowner invited the subject into the home while she checked with her husband; only to find out that she was the target of a scam.

NOTE: Residents should refrain from opening the door and inviting unknown subjects into their home. This can prove to be very dangerous and could lead to other criminal activity in the future (such as burglary or larceny).

- After advertising an item for sale on a website, the seller received a call from someone stating that they were interested in purchasing the items. The “buyer” then asked the seller to transfer funds to a third party in an effort to scam the seller out of the money.
- When selling an item ensure that the funds come directly

to you or use a reputable third party company and be sure that checks and other documents are valid before conducting the transaction. If something appears unusual to you check it out just to be sure.

- A resident received a letter telling them that they had won a substantial amount of money and needed to pay the taxes on it to receive the winnings. They were asked to wire the “tax” payment to a third party. The third party then receives the money but there are no “winnings” to be collected. This is a very old scam and has many variations but it is still around.

BENEFITS OF COMPOSTING AND INSTALLING A RAIN BARREL

Spring has sprung! Most of us are preparing our yards and gardens for planting by clearing beds, cutting back dead growth and creating new planting space. Now would be a good time to consider some enhancements to your gardens and yard. Two practices you might want to consider this year are composting and rain barrels, and here's why;

Benefits of Using Compost ("Benefits of Using Compost - Earth911.com")

- Improves the soil structure, porosity, and density, thus creating a better plant root environment.
- Increases moisture infiltration and permeability of heavy soils, thus reducing erosion and runoff.
- Supplies a variety of macro and micronutrients.
- May control or suppress certain soil-borne plant pathogens.
- Supplies significant quantities of organic matter.
- Supplies beneficial micro-organisms to soils and growing media.
- Improves and stabilizes soil pH.
- Can bind and degrade specific pollutants.
- Reduces the amount of trash sent to landfills that are brimming.
- Reduces the Town's transportation cost of hauling trash.

Benefits of Installing a Rain Barrel

- Reduces flooding in your yard or your basement; by collecting the water and using it for watering plants, or by slowly releasing it and allowing it to sink into the ground.
- Provides your plants with water they will love. Unlike treated water, which is "softened" with dissolved minerals, rain water is naturally soft. The water stored in your rain barrel is better than municipal water for washing your car and watering indoor or outdoor plants.
- Saves money and water. Instead of water from the tap or faucet, you can use the water you've saved to keep your home landscape happy and growing.
- Protects our rivers and streams. Water stored in your rain barrel is water that won't rush off into our streams. Instead, as you use the stored rain water around your home and garden, it will absorb slowly into the ground replenishing groundwater supplies. By decreasing the volume of storm runoff, rain barrels also help moderate stream erosion and the resulting pollution that is impairing our waterways.

Town residents are fortunate. We can take advantage of these beneficial practices because we don't have homeowner's covenants restricting our use. Once an initial investment is made, you'll reap the rewards for a long time and your garden will show it!

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

April 2001: Through the Fairfax County Office for Children's web site, called Child Care Central, county residents can perform a variety of tasks online any time of day. Parents can search for child care services and obtain information on child care costs and subsidized child care. Child care providers can find out how to apply for a child care permit and locate professional training opportunities.

April 1991: A physical disability need not prevent kids from enjoying one's childhood pleasures- Little League Baseball. Vienna Little League has formed a special league for handicapped youth age 6 through 18. Team sponsors have been found, new uniforms provided and games scheduled.

April 1981: Several Vienna residents will be spending Easter weekend, April 18-20, in Vienna's Sister City of Ceret, France. They are members of Les Compagnons de la Parole Francaise (Friends of the French Language), dedicated to promoting Franco-American understanding and friendship. Ceret has been home to a number of artists, including Picasso and Braque, and it is also known for its cherries, the first to arrive in the French markets each year.

April 1971: Minibikes will no longer be allowed to use previously authorized trails at Northside Park. Council's decision came as a result of a public hearing on April 12, attended by a majority of residents of homes abutting the park who protested the abuse of the trails by motorcycles, dune buggies and even cars.
