

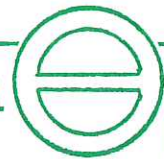

## CURBSIDE NEWSPAPER COLLECTION MAY 10, 11, 12

Curbside collection of newspapers for recycling, will be held on the second week of May, June and July in place of the regular trash pick-up.

The calendar printed below will indicate the days of the week for newspaper collection. Your day will be the same day of the week as your usual 2nd pickup - but only newspapers will be collected on that day. No magazines, cardboard or plastic bags will be accepted.

Tie papers in easily handled stacks. Do not use cans or plastic bags, but you may use brown paper grocery sacks. Have newspapers out by 8 a.m. on the day designated.

Ecocycle reminds you that its recycling center on Dominion Road is still accepting glass and cans.

FREEMAN HOUSE RESTORATION GETS COUNCIL GO-AHEAD

Council authorized the Town Manager to develop and implement a program for restoring the Freeman House, (at Church and Mill Streets), to usable condition and operation.

Detailed plans and cost estimates are being made for Council approval.

A resolution was adopted allowing for the restoration of the historic building to "safe, attractive and usable condition." According to the plan, the upper story will be converted into a dwelling unit for the use of a custodian, and an office will be available for the Chamber of Commerce.

The rest of the building will be a focal point for the preservation, collection, and display of historical furniture and artifacts, significant to local history. Small receptions and meetings by local adult groups will be held here, and historically significant ceremonies and celebrations.

Individuals may contribute furniture, artifacts and decorations, and local groups may help with minor portions of labor. The Vienna garden clubs are already working on plans for landscaping. An Advisory Commission of citizens will be appointed in the near future.

\* \* \* LIGHTS FOR TENNIS COURTS

Lighting will be provided this summer for the tennis courts at Meadow Lane Park. The courts will also be resurfaced.

"MOOREFIELD"

Council requested the Town Manager to coordinate with the Assistant for Planning and Development to file an application with the Virginia State Landmarks Commission to secure recognition of the Jeremiah Moore residence and the surrounding property as an historical site.

"Moorefield", home of early Baptist minister Jeremiah Moore, is located on the De Luca tract off Nutley Road. The family burial plot is on the property. It is hoped that the house and grounds may be saved when the land is developed.
