PUBLIC HEARING SLATED FOR PARK STREET WIDENING

The Virginia Department of Highways will conduct a public hearing March 21 at the Vienna Community Center on the widening of Park Street from its present two lanes to four lanes. The hearing will begin at 7:30 p.m.

A display will be at the Community Center a day before the public hearing for the benefit of residents. Maps, drawings and other information are available for public review and copying in the Department of Highways District Office located on Rte. 15 just south of the intersection of Rte. 3 in Culpeper, in the Fairfax County Resident Office at 3555 Chain Bridge Road in Fairfax, and in the office of the Town Manager at Vienna Town Hall, 127 Center Street, South, Vienna.

Town Council requested the Virginia Department of Highways to approve the reconstruction of Park Street to four lanes from Maple Avenue (Rte. 123) to Cedar Lane in November 1966. However, in July 1972 the Council requested the state to take no action on Park Street until the Town considered an alternate route using Dominion Road.

After considering the Dominion Road alternative, Council decided last November to seek state assistance for the widening and improving of Park Street.

Under state requirements the road would have to be constructed 48 feet wide. The state would pay 85 per cent of the cost while the Town would finance the remaining share.

Persons desiring to go on record as for or against the future widening and improvement of Park Street, but who will be unable to attend the public hearing should address their comments to Virginia Department of Highways, Fairfax County Resident Office, 3555 Chain Bridge Road, Fairfax, Va. 22030. Comments should be sent prior to the public hearing.

DO IT YOURSELF CAR POOL AVAILABLE AT TOWN HALL

Requests have been pouring in from residents seeking information on Vienna's car pool program. For the benefit of those considering car pooling as a way to beat the energy crisis there are two pages of listed areas in Virginia, Maryland and Washington to where car pooling is available. Interested persons can drop by Town Hall and look through the card files and match themselves up to other interested car poolers.



TREE ORDINANCE PASSES

The Vienna Town Council adopted an ordinance that prohibits the removal of trees on any new subdivision or commercial developments without the approval of the Council. The ordinance calls for developers to list and locate on a site plan the existing trees and their type, indicate trees which the developer wants to remove and have maintained and list specifications for the removal of trees and protection of trees during clearing and destruction.

The ordinance defines a tree as "any self-supporting woody plant growing upon the earth which usually produces a main trunk with a diameter of no less than four inches at a height of four and one-half feet above the ground, and which produces a more or less distinct and elevated head with many branches. Any dogwood or American holly whose main trunk measures no less than two inches in diameter at a height of three feet above the ground shall be considered a tree."

TRASH BAGS FOR HOLIDAY PICKUPS

The Town of Vienna does not pickup refuse on holidays and in an effort to provide some relief for those homeowners who miss a trash day because of the several Monday holidays, the Town is providing plastic garbage bags. Each household is eligible for two free bags for each Monday holiday. Homeowners may pick up the free bags at Town Hall. Ten bags will be distributed to cover the remaining Monday holidays in the calendar year. Residents may pick up their bags while taking care of other business at Town Hall, 127 Center Street, South.

GUIDELINES AND STANDARDS COMMITTEE

Mayor Joseph R. Spriggs is in the process of naming the Vienna Pornographic

Guidelines and Standards Committee.

The committee, made up of a spectrum of residents of the Vienna area, such as the following: Ministers, unmarried adults, married couples, parents of small children, parents of teenage children, retired residents, members of the business community and employees of the library.

The committee will set guidelines for movies, books and magazines in Vienna, but keeping within the Supreme Court decisions on pornography. "The first job for the committee is to define the recent Supreme Court decision on pornography," Mayor Spriggs said. "All guidelines will be within the court's decision. I don't foresee this committee as a group of citizens banning material in Town, but only as a group of citizens interpreting the Supreme Court's decisions on pornography."

The group will meet by mid-March. A steering committee will be appointed from the Guidelines Committee to present the guidelines to the Council.

DO'S AND DON'TS AT THE GAS STATION

Do's

- Be courteous to your neighbors in line and to the attendant (remember, he's under pressure, too.)
- Join a car pool or ride the bus if you possibly can.
- Walk or bike on short trips around Town.
- Consolidate your shopping trips with neighbors.
- In line, unlock your gas cap and have available a duplicate cap key.
- Carry small bills and change to speed up the gas line.
- Follow instructions of the policeman or operator directing traffic.
- Keep your car tuned to maximum gas-saving efficiency.
- Keep a safe distance from the car ahead of you in line--put car in "park" position as you approach gas pump.
- Keep this page of information for reference.

Don'ts

- Call gas station for open hours (for status report call 938-8000)
- Carry gas cans in your car--extremely dangerous fire hazard.
- Block driveways while waiting in line (residential or commercial.)
- Leave you car unattended while waiting in line.
- Ask for special exemptions or favors.
- "Top off" your tank with small purchases.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Two public hearings have been scheduled for March 25. Town Council will hear a rezoning request by Ronald D. Conklin to rezone 1.9 acres of land at 246 Lawyers Road from RS-16 to RS-12.5. The public hearing is scheduled at Town Hall, beginning at 8 p.m.

On the same day Council will conduct a public hearing to amend the Town zoning ordinances to permit the Vienna Zoning Administrator to issue Occupancy Permits to businesses in a building that is only partly completed. The amendment would permit businesses to move into completed sections of office buildings.

bag worm (bag wurm) n: the Larva of any of various moths (family Psychidae) that builds a cocoon like a bag and feeds on the leaves of various trees, especially evergreen trees of the eastern U.S.

Last year in Vienna, bag worms were a problem, especially to evergreens. A pesticide, Cygon, is recommended to rid your trees of bag worms. The pesticide is available at your neighborhood gardening center.

RECYCLING CENTER IN TOWN

A collection facility is available to Town residents for recyclable newspapers. The site is open around the clock at Ayr Hill Avenue and Dominion Road, next to the old railroad station.

In the first three weeks of operation the center collected six tons of newspapers. A second container has been added to accommodate the large bundles of paper left there.

TRAIL BIKES (A NO-NO)

Trail Bikes are prohibited from Town parks and trails. Trails are for walkers, joggers and bikers.

It is especially damaging to the soft terrain if trail bikes are used. It makes the trails too rough for biking.

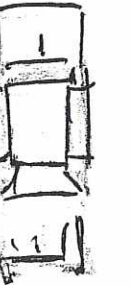
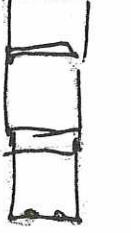
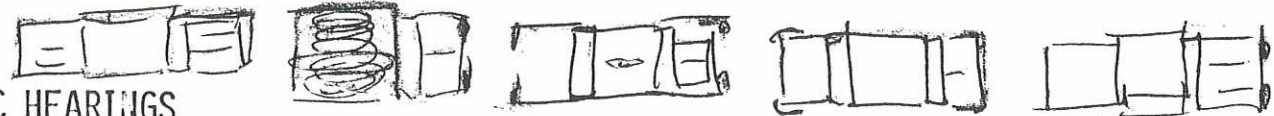
BIKEWAYS COMMITTEE

The Vienna Bikeways will have a meeting Saturday morning at 9:30, March 16 to consider a proposed ordinance for the control of bikes.

TOWN GENERAL ELECTION ON MAY 7

The Town's annual General Election will be at the Community Center this year on May 7. Voters will go to the polls to elect a mayor and three councilmen. Candidates for Town elections do not run on a party platform.

Mayor Joseph R. Spriggs, 104 Patrick Street, SE, will be running unopposed for reelection to the Mayor's seat.

Candidates running for three available council seats include two incumbents, Charles A. Robinson Jr., 124 Courthouse Road, SW, and Paul M. Lyons, 603 Upham Place, NW. Also running for council are: Thomas A. Rothwell Jr., 308 Cabin Road, SE, Stephen G. McConahey, 331 Lewis Street, NW; Martha H. Pruett, 514 Kibler Circle, SW, and Donald E. Upchurch, 505 Roberts Drive, NW.

Councilman Richard B. Dingman will not be seeking reelection.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Vienna residents may register to vote in the Town election at the Office of the General Registrar, 4101 Chain Bridge Road (Rte. 123), Fairfax, or on Thursdays from 7 to 8:55 p.m. at the Patrick Henry Library, 101 Maple Avenue East (Rte. 123), Vienna. As a special service to Vienna residents, special hours for registration will be set up at the Patrick Henry Library from 1 to 5 p.m., March 30, and all day Saturday, April 6. Deadline for voter registration is April 8.

Residents must be 18 years of age by November 6 of each year, a citizen of the United States and a legal resident of Fairfax County.

BUS SHELTERS ON VIEW

The Town with the cooperation of the Maintenance & Repair Shop students of Madison High School have designed and constructed a bus shelter for Vienna Metrobus users.

The shelter is on display, across from the Patrick Henry Library, at the Mini-Park on Maple Avenue and Center Streets.
