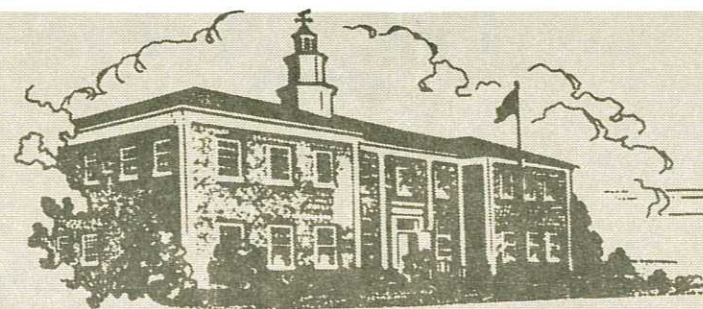

Council To Consider Phase I of Bike Map at Feb. 24 Meeting

Town Council will consider adopting Phase I of the Vienna Bikeway Map at its regular meeting of Feb. 24.

The Map includes three different proposed routes: the Washington and Old Dominion Railroad right-of-way, bike-paths and linking bikeroutes to the stream valley system of hiking and biking trails. The routes are shown on the Vienna Bikeway Map on page 2.

Some 4.5 miles of the bikepaths would have to be improved to meet suggested bikepaths standards of eight feet wide with two inches of asphalt surface and four inches of rock base. Estimated cost of the improvements would be \$12,000. Signs would also have to be erected throughout the system at a cost of approximately \$1,000.

Council has already budgeted \$5,000 in Revenue Sharing Funds for surfacing of hiking and biking trails in parks. Other monies would have to be obtained from other sources if Phase I of the Bikeway Map is approved.

Auto Registrations

Residents of the Town must have all their automobiles registered and display a Town of Vienna license on their auto. Licenses, available this year in either decal or metal plate form, will go on sale at Town Hall March 15.

Registration fee is \$15 per automobile, \$8 for each motorcycle and \$1 for active military personnel. Registration forms will be sent to each household shortly.

Automobiles regularly housed or stored in Town, by law, must be registered.

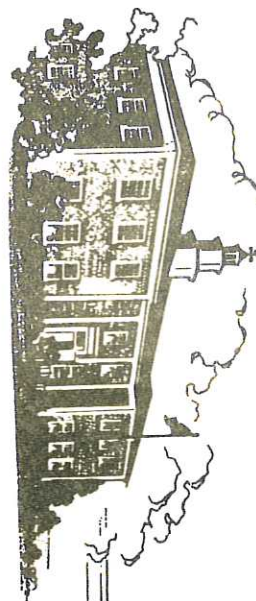

Two Rezoning Hearings Set for March

Two rezonings and a mini-bus proposal will be the subjects of three public hearings scheduled in March.

On March 10, starting at 8 p.m. in the Town Council Chambers of Town Hall, Council will have a hearing on the two rezoning applications. First, is the application submitted by Daniel Orlich to rezone part of Lot 4, the Alice Marie Young property, located in the 500 block of Church Street (south side of street,) NE, containing 2.23 acres, from RS-16 (single family detached homes so that

there is one structure per every 16,000 square feet) and C-1 (Commercial) to RTH (Townhouses.) The second rezoning request is on the application of Ralph Louk and Kohler-Daniels Associates to rezone 12.7 acres in the 500 block of Church Street (north side of street), NE, from RS-16 to RTH and RS-10 (single family detached homes so that there is only one structure per every 10,000 square feet.)

The Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on both rezoning applications on February 26, starting at 8 p.m. in Town Hall.

The mini-bus proposal will be the subject of a March 24 public hearing. More information on the proposal including price estimates, fare structures, routes, equipment needed and personnel needed to operate such a system will be presented in the March Newsletter.

Residents Should Report Unlicensed Solicitors

There is an ordinance that protects Town residents from solicitors operating in Town illegally, but the bulk of its enforcement depends on the residents.

When a canvasser or solicitor comes to your door he must be wearing a badge indicating that he is licensed by the Town Clerk of the Town of Vienna. If a solicitor is not wearing a badge, ask to see the badge and his license. If he doesn't have a license contact the Town Clerk's Office at 938-8000 during the day and the Police Department during the evenings and weekends at 938-4900.

Non-profit organizations do not need to obtain a license, however, they must notify the Police Department and Town Clerk's Office that they are soliciting in Town and the period they plan to operate.

Report Damaged Lights

Mercury vapor street lamps with damaged globes pose health hazards and should be reported to the Vienna Public Works Department as soon as they are detected.

The mercury vapor lamps give off ultraviolet rays when the globe is broken or damaged. The rays are a health hazard.

Exposure to ultraviolet rays can cause intense eye irritation and sunburn.

Approximately 50 percent of the street lights in Town are high intensity mercury vapor lights. These lamps are characterized by the blue light they emit.

BB Guns Prohibited

The Wesley Methodist Church recently had its large stained glass window damaged by BB guns. The vandalism incident will cost hundreds of dollars to repair.

It is unlawful to use BB guns, airguns, sling-shots, bow and arrows, or any instrument projecting missiles in the Town of Vienna.

Nix Street Merchants

An ordinance that prohibits street merchants from operating in Town was adopted by the Town Council.

"No peddler shall conduct business from a stationary location in the public streets nor shall any have an exclusive right to any location in the public streets, nor shall he be permitted to operate in any congested area where his operations might impede or inconvenience the public," according to the newly adopted ordinance.
