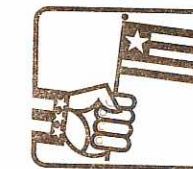
Big July 4th Celebration

Vienna's big annual Independence Day celebration will be held on Saturday, July 4, on the grounds of Vienna Elementary School behind the Community Center.

An outdoor flea market featuring art, crafts and antiques will be open from 12 noon to 5 p.m. A variety of entertainment, games and races for young and old is scheduled throughout the day, and many different kinds of foods will be for sale.

Evening entertainment will be provided by the Vienna Community Band, followed by the fireworks display at 8:30 p.m.

Vienna League to Host 1981 Babe Ruth State Tournament

The Greater Vienna Babe Ruth League will host this year's State Tournament for 16 to 18 year olds July 31-August 4. District all-star teams, representing young athletes from across Virginia will arrive in town July 30, and many of them will be staying with Vienna families during the tournament.

All of the players will attend the opening day ceremony at 7 p.m. July 31 at Waters Field near the Community Center. Senator John Warner and Representative Frank Wolf will be special guests at the ceremony, along with members of the Vienna Town Council, Fairfax County Board Chairman Jack Herrity, Centreville District Supervisor Martha Pennino and a number of Babe Ruth state and district officials.

Following the ceremony, the Vienna Host All Stars will take on a visiting team in one of the first-round games of the tournament. The tournament champions will travel to Nashville to compete in the Southeast Regional Babe Ruth Tournament.

All town residents are invited to come out to Waters Field on opening day and throughout the tournament to show their support for Vienna's fine young players and for the local Babe Ruth organization and its civic and business sponsors. Without the dedication of these adult volunteers, the town's young people would not have the fine athletic programs they now enjoy.

Tax Rates Set for FY 1981-82

At a special meeting on June 22, the Town Council set the following tax rates and fees for fiscal year 1981-82:

Real estate — 33¢ per \$100 valuation, a 2¢ increase.

Business licenses — Business services, 23¢ per \$100; Contractors, 12¢ per \$100; Professionals, 52¢ per \$100; Rental, 17¢ per \$100; Repair, 17¢ per \$100; Retail, 17¢ per \$100. These rates represent a 15% increase in all categories. The wholesale rate remains unchanged at 10¢ per \$100.

Sewer rate — \$1.62 per 1,000 gallons, a 21¢ increase.

Utility taxes — Increased from 10% of the first \$25 to 20% of the first \$15 for residential users and from 10% to 15% of the first \$300 for commercial users.

Town Earns Second Annual Certificate of Conformance

For the second consecutive year, the Town has been awarded the prestigious Certificate of Conformance in Financial Reporting by the Municipal Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada.

The Certificate of Conformance is the highest form of recognition a local government can receive in the areas of accounting and financial reporting. It is important to the Town as a means of achieving and maintaining a favorable bond rating.

In order to be awarded a Certificate of Conformance, the Town is required to publish an easily readable and efficiently organized Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, which must satisfy both generally accepted accounting principles and applicable legal requirements.

Eligible reports are evaluated by a Special Review Committee composed of government finance officers, certified public accountants, educators and others with particular expertise in the areas of accounting and financial reporting.

Malcolm Heights Neighborhood Eligible for Home Energy Audits

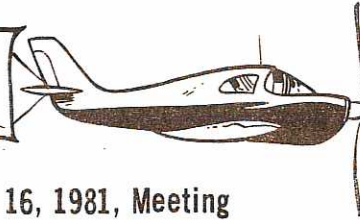
Vienna's Malcolm Heights neighborhood is one of five areas in Fairfax County targeted for free home energy audits this month. The audits will be conducted by the County Department of Community Action, in cooperation with the Office of Energy and Emergency Services and Solar Works, Inc., a private energy consulting firm. The project is being funded through the Federal Community Services Administration's Energy Crisis Intervention Program.

Participants in the program will receive a detailed report on their homes, including an analysis of fuel bills, combustion efficiency of furnaces, air infiltration evaluation and recommendations for reducing heating and cooling costs. In addition, the homes will be assessed for solar potential, and at least four homes will be selected to receive free solar heating systems.

Audits will be conducted on site by representatives of Solar Works, Inc., who will be accompanied by the County Energy Projects Coordinator.

Council Action



Results of Town Council's March 16, 1981, Meeting

- * Adopted a resolution urging continuation of the Fairfax County Park Authority for a period of 20 years.
- * Adopted the recommendations of the Public Works Department for school sidewalk construction, funding to come from Contingency Reserve at this time but to be replaced by subsequent General Bond funds.
- * Granted the request to exempt the cul-de-sac at the end of Blair Road from Town requirements concerning parking in circles and cul-de-sacs.
- * Took no action concerning signs designating the Windover Heights Historic District.
- * Approved the installation of a street light between 507 and 515 Druid Hill Rd., N.E., as requested by residents.
- * Adopted a resolution authorizing the Town Manager to apply to the State Division of Litter Control for a litter control grant.

Results of Town Council's April 6, 1981, Meeting

- * Approved the installation of street lights at the following locations, as requested by residents: between 1116 and 1120 Fairway Drive; in front of 1136 Fairway Drive; and between 304 and 306 Old Courthouse Road.
- * Accepted a bid of \$51,577 submitted by John C. Louis Co., Inc., for a Trojan 1900 rubber-tired overhead loader.
- * Accepted the off-site improvements at 400 Roland St., S.W. into the Town's maintenance system.

Results of Town Council's April 20, 1981, Meeting

- * Voted to reclassify the firm of Buswell and Bennett from personal service to business service in the classification schedule of business licenses and to refund to the firm \$945.12, as the new license category is effective with this current year.
- * Donated \$1,000 to the Vienna Raiders Traveling Soccer Team to help defray expenses of a trip to play in the Scandinavian countries, funds to come from contingency reserve.
- * Denied a request for pipestem lots at 401 Glyndon St., N.E.
- * Approved transfer of funds within the budget as presented by the Director of Finance.
- * Approved the installation of a street light between 208 and 214 Glen Ave., S.W. as requested by residents.
- * Accepted the bids submitted by National Asphalt Paving Corp. and National Asphalt Manufacturing Co. for asphalt for 1981-82.

Results of Town Council's May 11, 1981, Meeting

- * Accepted the report of the Charter Review Committee for information.
- * Approved the final plat of the resubdivision of part of Block 9, Onondio.
- * Authorized placement of No Parking signs on both sides of Pleasant St., N.W. from Windover Ave. to Maple Ave.
- * Referred a request for a four-way stop sign and appropriate crosswalk lanes at the Adahi Rd./Park St. intersection to the Transportation Safety

Commission for recommendation to Council so that a decision may be made prior to school opening in the fall.

* Authorized Magruders to use a trailer on the property leased by them for a sixty-day period.

* Approved the installation of street lights on the north side of Roland St. at the following locations: middle of the block between Nutley St. and Ceret Ct.; at the intersection of Roland and Ceret; and in the middle of the block between Ceret and Wade Hampton Dr.

* Accepted the bid by Phillip C. Clarke Electrical Contractor, Inc., of \$4,875 for an emergency traffic signal at the fire station.

* Appointed Mrs. Betty Henon and Mr. Thomas Kamstra to the Historic Windover Board of Review for two-year terms.

* A petition requesting removal of prohibited turn signs at Echols, Alma, Orrin, Hine and Follin Lane was forwarded to the Transportation Safety Commission for study and recommendation. The Commission will be provided with all petitions, etc. that led to the placement of the present signs. The citizens involved in the original placement of the signs will be advised that the matter is up for restudy before it is placed on the Commission agenda.

* Voted to reserve the unexpended balance of funds derived from the sale of aluminum collected at the Town's recycling center at the close of the fiscal year in a separate account to be used for beautification purposes.

Results of Town Council's May 18, 1981, Meeting

* Authorized the Mayor to write a letter of appreciation to Mr. Charles Sloan for his service on the Historic Windover Board of Review and enclose a Certificate of Appreciation.

* Donated \$500 to the '67 Vienna Wildcats Boys Traveling Soccer Team to help defray expenses for the team's trip to Toronto to participate in the Robbie International Soccer Tournament.

* Denied a request for pipestem lots and 70.5-foot lot widths at 408 Glyndon St., N.E.

* Appointed Mr. Richard K. Burch as the Architectural Review Board member and Mr. Jerry Barnett as the Planning Commission member to serve on the Historic Windover Board of Review for a two-year period.

* Forwarded a request for a four-way stop sign at the intersection of Tapawingo Rd. and Ware St., S.W., to the Transportation Safety Commission for consideration and recommendation.

* Endorsed the report of the task force to revise the Fairfax County Schools directives concerning use of school facilities.


Results of Town Council's June 1, 1981, Meeting

* Approved the installation of a street light between 105 and 109 Wilmar Pl., N.W., as requested by residents.

* Accepted and expressed appreciation for the report of the Charter Review Committee and approved the committee's recommendation that compensation of the Mayor not exceed \$4,000 and of Council members \$3,500 per year.

* Endorsed the general concept of a Springfield Bypass Arterial Highway within the proposed corridor, which would not place additional traffic burdens on the town.
