Church Street Corner to get Facelift

Big things are coming to Church Street. Within the next couple of years, the properties at the corner of Church Street NW and Lawyer's Road NW will be transformed from two dated and aging buildings to a single, three-story, mixed-use building complete with restaurants, office space, residential space, and a two-level parking garage in the rear. The Vienna Town Council unanimously approved the project at its regular meeting on July 11, consistent with the Church Street Vision that the Vienna Town Council adopted in July 1999.

"I think it's going to add a lot to Church Street, a lot to our town and a lot to that corner," said Mayor Linda Colbert after the developer's presentation of the latest project enhancements.

The approved development is the fifth in a series of projects designed to enhance the economic vitality of the historic Church Street commercial corridor. It is being created with bicyclists and pedestrians in mind, a design that is reminiscent of late 19th and early 20th century small-town America.

That’s a Wrap!

Liberty Amendments Month wrapped up in July, and it was another successful celebration filled with education, inspiration, and family friendly events and activities. Nearly 11,000 people attended this year’s celebration, which ran from June 18 through July 19. It featured weekly events for kids and adults, not to mention the Independence Day Celebration at Yeonas Park and Vienna’s first-ever naturalization ceremony where 15 people from 15 different countries took the Oath of Allegiance at the Community Center to become United States citizens.

Liberty Amendments Month was established in 2021 to bring community members together to celebrate our common bonds, including the Amendments to the U.S. Constitution that gave full citizenship rights to those who were previously excluded from the Constitution. This year’s series was presented by the Town of Vienna, Fairfax County government and numerous community organizations, businesses and churches.

Vienna Hosts its First-ever Naturalization Ceremony

For more than 220 years, people from all over the world have made the bold decision to take the Oath of Allegiance to become naturalized United States citizens. On Saturday, July 2, 2022, 15 people from Canada to Congo took that oath during an inspiring Liberty Amendments Month naturalization ceremony. Afterward, many of the new citizens even registered to vote!

“The decision to renounce allegiance to one’s country of birth to become a United States citizen must be very emotional,” said Vienna Parks and Recreation event coordinator Lily Widman. “Our homeland is such a big part of our identity, yet, for hundreds of years people from other countries who admire our way of life in the United States have taken the necessary steps to go through the process, which is not easy, and their journey is truly inspiring.”

The Vienna naturalization ceremony was part of a Liberty Amendments Month mini-fest celebrating the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Mayor Linda Colbert welcomed the honorees, and representatives from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services administered the oath. The Director of U.S. National Intelligence, Avril Haines, delivered the keynote address. 🇺🇸

Business Committee Chairman Remembered for Community Service

It's not easy assuming a leadership role during a pandemic, but Robert "Bob" Leggett did it willingly and enthusiastically when he became chairman of the Town Business Liaison Committee (TBLC) in 2020. Upon learning of his death on Sunday, July 17, 2022, Town leaders reflected on Leggett's ability to bring people together for the greater good of the community.

"Bob loved Vienna and wanted to make a difference in his community," said Mayor Linda Colbert, who often visited local businesses with him. "In his role as TBLC Chairman, he actively helped connect struggling businesses with resources to help them survive COVID-related economic hardship, and that made all the difference."

Leggett, a retired CIA analyst and senior executive, was first appointed to the TBLC in 2017 and became chairman three years later, about the time the Town of Vienna appointed its first economic development manager. Leggett is widely remembered for leading the TBLC through the transition period by helping to define its evolving role in the Town's economic development strategy.

"Bob cared deeply about the business community," said Economic Development Manager Natalie Monkou. "He understood the value of the TBLC's institutional knowledge, and he made it a point to foster collaboration between the TBLC and the economic development office to problem solve and to define emerging roles."

Because of Bob's love of Vienna, the Leggett family notified Town leaders on Monday, July 18, 2022, that in lieu of flowers, they are asking that donations be made to the Town of Vienna. A Sign of Change

With little fanfare at the request of residents who live on the street, Wade Hampton Drive is now officially known as Liberty Lane. The public works department installed the new street sign with the new name on July 1, 2022.

The short street located off Maple Avenue had been known for generations as Lewis Street, S.W. until 1962, when it was renamed for former slaveholder and Confederate general Wade Hampton in recognition of the 100th anniversary of the American Civil War. The street is roughly the location of where Hampton and his cavalry unit of about 600 men and horses came into Vienna at the end of December 1862 under the direction of Confederate General J.E.B. Stuart.

The Vienna Town Council voted to change the name after a public hearing and an ad hoc committee's recommendation to rename the street. Of five name options the committee put forth, the Council voted unanimously Feb. 7, 2022 to adopt the name Liberty Lane. 📌

The New Town Council Election Cycle: The Whys and Hows

Until this year, May elections were an annual rite of spring in Vienna. But no longer. That’s because the Virginia legislature passed a law mandating that all municipal elections be held in November, and Vienna was forced to comply. While the Commonwealth required the change to the month of local elections, they allowed municipalities latitude in how to apply the new cycle to their elections.

A few months ago, the Town Council voted to change its election cycle. The most important changes were to:

- Move the election month from May to November;
- Change the frequency from annual to bi-annual elections; and
- Align the two-year terms in office for the entire Town Council.

Many variables make up an election cycle, and the Town Council carefully weighed the pros and cons associated with these different variables. Among the issues we considered:

Odd versus even years: Even-year November elections include congressional and senatorial offices every two years, and presidential candidates every four years. Odd-year elections include only state and local offices. The majority of Council preferred elections in odd years, reasoning that state and local issues would be more of a focus in “off-years.”

Staggered versus concurrent terms: Staggering terms eliminates the possibility of a complete turnover in councilmembers in one election. Annual May elections allowed for the combination of staggering and two-year terms. But the move to November elections changed the equation. The only way to achieve two-year terms and elections in odd years was to drop staggering. Now all Council seats will be on the ballot at the same time.

Length of term: For years, the length of Vienna Council and Mayoral terms has been two years. The Council considered four-year terms, which would have allowed for term-staggering under an odd-year-only election cycle. There was little support by Council for longer terms, however, mainly due to concerns that longer terms would attract fewer candidates.

Finally, the Council majority thought it best to shift to the new cycle in one move, and as quickly as possible. To achieve this goal, current terms were extended to November 2023, when the new election cycle will begin. From that point forward, Vienna town elections will occur every other November, with all six council and mayoral seats on the ballot. Be sure to mark your calendar and exercise your right to vote! 🗳️



Let’s Eat Outside!

Summer is the perfect time to dine outdoors, and Vienna’s updated outdoor dining ordinance allows additional ways for many Vienna restaurants to offer dining outdoors. Leaf Mulch Program Grinds to a Halt Curbside Leaf Collection to Continue

After years of noise complaints from residents who live near the Town’s Beulah Road leaf mulch facility and declining interest from residents in using the free mulch, the Vienna Town Council unanimously voted at its regular meeting, Monday, July 11, to disband the Town’s leaf mulch program for the next year. Instead, the Council approved a motion made by Councilmember Steve Potter to eliminate leaf grinding and allow the public works department to continue its curbside leaf removal program, temporarily store the collected leaves at the facility on Beulah Road, and then use the most efficient means, either commercial or Town trucks, to haul the leaves out of town for disposal.

“The lowest common denominator is cost,” Potter said. “If we look at the round-trip cost of using our fleet and our own employees, the cost of hauling 25 cubic yards of leaves is \$192.81. The cost of using a rental fleet with larger trucks is \$138.02, which is a 40 percent difference.” Potter noted that many rental trucks have higher capacity than Town-owned trucks, which would require fewer trips to and from disposal sites and likely result in a reduction in transportation costs to haul leaves.

The Council’s decision to stop the Town’s leaf-mulch operation gives the public works department the needed flexibility to develop a leaf-removal solution that would be most efficient and cost effective in the long run. The solution could include using a combination of both Town-owned and rental fleets to haul leaves to disposal sites. The public works department will report the results of this year’s leaf-removal efforts to the Town Council next year.

For decades, the Town collected leaves and ground them into mulch that was available for residents to use at no charge. Residential demand for leaf mulch declined in recent years, and a recent public works survey of mulch users confirmed waning interest. The declining interest and feedback from several public hearings, emails and phone calls helped inform the Council’s decision to end the leaf mulch program. 📌



Mayor’s Pet of the Month

Met Baxter, the once-rescued dog turned rescuer and inspiration for a new social media initiative to recognize the Town’s pets! He’s the reason Mayor Linda Colbert, an animal-lover herself, initiated the Pet of the Week award on social media. Each week, she honors a different Vienna pet nominated by its owner, and each month she will select one pet to be featured as Pet of the Month in the Vienna Voice. Baxter is the inaugural Pet of the Month.

“I am thrilled with the response we’ve gotten so far,” Colbert said. “Vienna residents love their pets, and these stories will surely brighten your day!”

It all started when Mayor Linda Colbert was told about Baxter’s instinctive actions to summon help when his owner started to

slip into a diabetic coma on three separate occasions. Mayor Colbert was so impressed, she honored Baxter recently with a special Hometown Hero award and surprised him with his favorite treat – meatballs from Maggio’s and Skorpios restaurant.

Baxter is a 5-1/2-year-old Redbone Coonhound rescue dog adopted by Vienna residents Dave and Rita Eastlack. Baxter was 10 weeks old when the Eastlack’s adopted him – just two weeks after the dog had been found abandoned in a South Carolina dumpster. He’s a survivor whose protective instincts helped save his owner’s life three times. Congratulations, Baxter! You’re the very first Mayor’s Pet of the Month! 📌

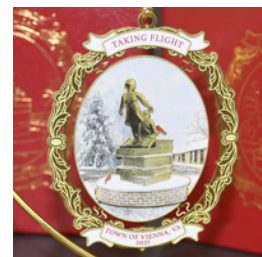
