Health Fair

The Vienna Woman's Club will hold its annual free Health Fair at the Vienna Community Center on Saturday, April 20, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Free health screenings for visual acuity, anemia, blood pressure, height, weight and others will be provided to persons 18 years old and over. An optional blood chemistry and coronary risk profile will be offered for \$15. This test requires a 12-hour fast.

Cleanup Begins April 15th

Vienna's Spring Cleanup will be conducted quadrant-by-quadrant this month and next according to the schedule on this page.

In an effort to keep Vienna looking attractive this spring, the Town Council has directed that Cleanup items not be placed at the curbside more than seven days prior to the scheduled starting date in each section of town. Residents who set out discards too soon may be required to remove them or to pay \$30 for a special pickup.

1985 SPRING CLEANUP SCHEDULE

Quadrant	Starting Date
Northeast	April 15
Southeast	April 22
Southwest	May 7
Northwest	May 22

(Adverse weather may require minor adjustments in this schedule)

Council has adopted several revisions to the Cleanup regulations:

- * Each residence is limited to 300 pounds of concrete per Cleanup.
- * Scrap metal is also limited to 300 pounds per residence per Cleanup. Whole automobile bodies will not be removed.

- * Leaves will not be picked up during the Cleanup. Leaves in plastic bags will be picked up on regular trash collection days.

- * Only two major appliances may be discarded per residence per Cleanup. These include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, washers, driers, hot

water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces.

- * No debris of any kind may be brought in from outside of town for pickup by Cleanup crews.

Except for these limitations, residents may place any items at the curbside for free pickup. Brush and branches should be separated from other discards, and all Cleanup items must be kept away from regular trash, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles.

Because Cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other public works duties, there is time for only one Cleanup sweep of each quadrant of town. Once a section has been covered, crews cannot double back.

Vienna residents are reminded that they do not need to purchase a Fairfax County vehicle sticker, but they are required to pay County personal property tax on all vehicles. Personal property information must be filed with the County by May 1 or, after that date, within 30 days of purchase of a new vehicle.

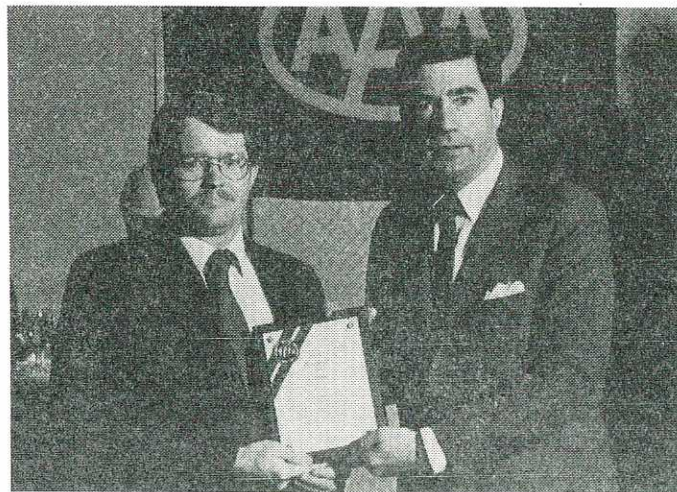
Schoeberlein Is Town Manager

The Town Council has selected John H. Schoeberlein to become Town Manager beginning April 22.

Schoeberlein, 37, is currently County Administrator of Winnebago County, Illinois, and previously served as City Manager of Pompano Beach, Florida, and City Clerk of Highland Park, Illinois.

He was chosen from among 185 applicants in a nationwide search that began when former Town Manager Brackenridge H. Bentley resigned last January to become Town Manager of Front Royal.

Schoeberlein and his wife Julie have a 12-year old son, Adam. The new Town Manager's family will join him in Vienna at the end of the school year.

Town Council Action . . .

February 25, 1985

- Following a public hearing, authorized the renewal of \$2.5 million in public improvement bond anticipation notes.
- Conducted a public hearing to receive citizen input for the FY 1985-86 Town budget.
- Approved publication of a request for proposals for a traffic flow study of the entire town.
- Directed that surplus Town property items on which no bids were received be offered to the Salvation Army for removal from Town Hall.
- Established starting dates for the Spring Cleanup (see front page).

March 4, 1985

- Took no action on a request to rezone the property at the corner of Nutley and Roland Streets, S.W., from single-family residential to townhouse, the application having been withdrawn.
- Adopted a resolution establishing a Vienna Town-Business Liaison Committee. Council will consider committee membership at a future work session.
- Took no action concerning traffic controls at the Mill St./Ayr Hill Ave./Dominion Rd. intersections.
- Approved a request for a three-way stop at Westbriar and St. Andrews Drives, N.E. The stop signs will be reconsidered by September 30 after the Police Department's traffic enforcement division is in operation.
- Denied a request for a three-way stop at Locust and Center Streets.
- Took no action on a request for a four-way stop at Church St. and Beulah Rd., pending a recommendation from the Transportation Safety Commission.

- Denied a request for stop signs on Fairway Dr. at Overlook Dr. and Course St. The need for these signs was eliminated when restrictive traffic signs were installed.
- Approved the following Transportation Safety Commission recommendations:
 - Improve synchronization of Maple Ave. traffic lights.
 - Do not establish reversible lanes on Maple Ave.
 - It is possible to increase left-turn time from Beulah Rd. onto Maple Ave.
 - Do not increase left-turn time from East St. onto Maple Ave.
 - Increase pressure with County and State to open Abbotsford Dr. completely between Beulah and Old Courthouse Roads.
 - Study improving access to the Dulles Toll Rd. and Rte. 7.
 - Study adding an additional lane from Rte. 66 onto the Beltway. Council also voted to ask the State Highway Department to post "Keep Up Speed" signs coming south from the Beltway onto Rte. 66.

Council took no action on Commission recommendations concerning closing the entrance to Danor Shopping Center opposite Beulah Rd., and pushing for opening Abbotsford Dr. between Beulah and Lawyers Rd.

- Appointed a task force of Planning Commission and Transportation Safety Commission members and Town staff to develop a model residential parking ordinance.
- Directed that any requests for additional traffic signals on Maple Ave. be included in the upcoming town traffic study.
- Adopted revisions to Spring and Fall Cleanup procedures (see front page).
- Asked the Planning Commission to hold a public hearing on a proposed amendment to the home occupation ordinance to restrict storage of equipment and merchandise to inside the principal residential structure.

Nine Candidates in May 7 Town Election

The annual Town election will be held on Tuesday, May 7. All voting will take place at the Vienna Community Center from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

This year, voters will elect three Town Council members for two-year terms beginning July 1. Election results can be heard on the Vienna Newsline, 938-4499, one to two hours after the polls close.

The Candidates

Peter S. Bielauskas is a 20-year Vienna resident and lives at 202 Mashie Dr., S.E. He is a realtor with Owen Realty. He is a member of the American Association of Retired Persons and the American Legion, and currently serves on the board of directors of Cardinal Hill Swim and Racquet Club. This is his first bid for a Council seat.

Mary Jane Cronin, 109 James Dr., S.W., has been a Vienna resident since 1961 and is seeking election to Council for the first time. She is a board member and chair of the issues committee of Voters for a Better Council, a state chairperson of Common Cause and a board member of the Annandale Christian Community Association Child Care Center. She is a social science research analyst for the Administration on Aging.

Richard L. Fisher is currently chairman of the Town Planning Commission and previously served on the Transportation Safety Commission. He is a football coach with Vienna Youth Incorporated. A 10-year Vienna resident, he lives at 449 Nelson Dr., N.E., and is manager of gas control distribution operations for Washington Gas Light Company. He is running for Council for the first time.

Lucille C. Gasparine is a Council candidate for the first time. She is a stewardess with United Airlines and also sells real estate locally with Avis

Adams and Associates. She lives at 301 Patrick St., S.W., and has been a Vienna resident for 13 years.

Louis M. James is seeking election to Council for the first time. A town resident for almost three years, he lives at 106 Ross Dr., S.W. He belongs to the Vienna (Host) Lions Club and is a Madison High School band parent. He is deputy chief of the Defense Department's Wage Authority.

George Juskaian has been a candidate in the last two Town elections. A retired U.S. Army colonel, he is a member of several veterans groups, 1st vice president of the Vienna chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons, an adult committee member of local scout troops, and a parent volunteer at Westbriar Elementary. He has lived in Vienna for seven years at 111 St. Andrews Dr., N.E.

Robert W. Robinson was first elected to Council in 1980 and again in 1983. He is past vice president and currently a board member of the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department, a member of the American Legion and a U.S. Army reservist. A town resident for 16 years, he lives at 204 Cedar Ln., S.E., and is a funeral director at Money and King Funeral Home.

Rodger W. Seeman is completing his first term on Council, and previously served on the Planning Commission and Transportation Safety Commission. He is a member of the Vienna Optimist Club, Vienna Wireless Society, American Legion and other community organizations. He is an engineer/architect with the Veterans Administration and has lived in Vienna for 17 years at 600 Blackstone Terr., N.W.

Anna C. Shullaw, 713 Upham Pl., N.W., has lived in Vienna for eight years and is a first-time Council candidate. She is president of the Louise Archer Elementary PTA, vice chairman of Voters for a Better Council, and an assistant commissioner of Vienna Youth Soccer. She has taught in a

number of schools, most recently at Our Lady of Good Counsel.
