First Traffic Officer on Duty

Officer Tom Sherwood, a 14-year veteran of the Vienna Police Department, is the first officer to be assigned to the Town's special traffic enforcement unit.

Officer Sherwood began his new duties on February 1 and will be joined by an additional traffic officer and two motorcycle officers by late spring.

The traffic unit was approved by the Town Council and funds budgeted for its implementation this fiscal year in response to numerous citizen complaints about growing traffic and speeding problems in residential neighborhoods. Creation of the traffic unit represents a substantial commitment by the Vienna Police to strict enforcement of traffic laws through increased

patrols and radar operations in problem areas.

Two motorcycles have been purchased for the traffic unit and will be on the street in late April or early May after officers have been trained and certified in their use. When the traffic unit is fully operational, the officers' duties will include radar enforcement; escorts, parades, and other crowd activity; traffic surveys and accident analyses; and handling serious accidents involving injuries.

Car Tag Time

1986 Town of Vienna vehicle stickers will be sold beginning Monday, March 17. The windshield decal must be displayed by midnight April 15.

The fee is \$20 for vehicles weighing 4,000 pounds or more, \$15 for vehicles less than 4,000 pounds, and \$8 for motorcycles. Stickers may be purchased by mail or in person at Town Hall.

Town of Vienna residents do not need to obtain Fairfax County vehicle stickers, but they are required to pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles.

Business License Renewals Due

All persons operating a business within the Town of Vienna are reminded that 1986 business licenses must be obtained by March 1. This includes home occupations as well as businesses located in commercial zones.

After the deadline date, a 10% penalty is applied to the license fee. Licenses delinquent after April 1 are also assessed interest.

The annual license tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. License tax forms are available in the Finance Department at Town Hall.

Voter Deadline

April 5 is the last day to register to vote in the Town election on May 6. Vienna residents who are U.S. citizens and at least 18 years old on election day may register.

Voter registration will be conducted at Patrick Henry Library each Wednesday in March from 7 to 9 p.m. For other registration sites and hours, call the General Registrar's office at 385-8100.

Physically disabled persons who want to register to vote may do so by requesting a voter registrar to make a home visit. To be eligible for home registration, an applicant must have a continuing illness or physical disability that would prohibit registration in person at the General Registrar's office.

To arrange for home registration, call the Registrar's office for an application. The application must be witnessed by two individuals and signed by a physician.

Booth Space Available

Vienna businesses, community organizations, and handcrafters are invited to participate in ViVa! Vienna! '86, which attracts thousands of area residents each year. Booth space is limited to Church Street between Mill Street and Lawyers Road and to Dominion Road between Church and Ayr Hill Avenue, and applications will be handled on a first-come, first-served basis.

APPALACHIAN TRAIL LECTURE

Well-known hiker Dr. Warren Doyle will give a free lecture on Appalachian Trail expeditions at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 4, at the Vienna Community Center.

The presentation combines personal narrative and slides with popular music and is suitable for all ages.

Dr. Doyle is director of the Hemlock Overlook Outdoor Education Center operated by George Mason University. He has walked the entire Appalachian Trail from Georgia to Maine a record six times, and he organized the longest and largest voluntary footpath trek in modern American history when a group of 19 college students walked the entire length of the trail in 110 days without anyone dropping out.

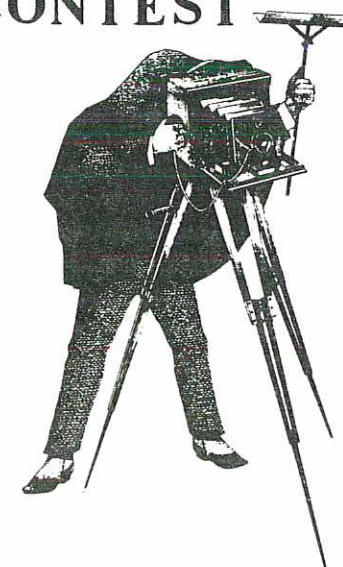

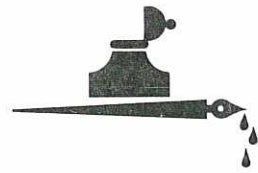
1986 PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST

Town Council Action...

January 27, 1986

• Continued until March 3 the public hearing on an application to rezone the property at 135 Wade Hampton Dr. and 125 Roland St., S.W., from RS-16, single-family residential, to RTH, townhouses.

• Awarded the contract for new sound and recording systems in the Council Chamber to Maryland Sound Industries, Inc., of Baltimore at the bid price of \$19,375, less applicable discounts, \$10,000 to come from bond funds, \$9,375 from contingency account.

• Accepted a bid of \$12,948 by Cycles Fairfax for two 1986 Kawasaki P5, 1,000 cc, fully equipped motorcycles, \$12,350 to come from budgeted funds, \$598 from contingency account.

• Nominated Don Koval for appointment to the Fairfax County Athletic Council.

• Appointed Fannie Travis as the Board of Architectural Review member to serve on the Windover Heights Board of Review for a two-year term.

• Awarded a contract for actuarial studies of the Town's police and non-police pension plans to Milliman & Robertson, Inc., Washington, D.C., at a cost not to exceed \$4,400.

• Advised the Town's representative on the Vienna Metro Station Task Force that Council's position remains unchanged regarding land development around the station. Council believes the land ought to be down-zoned, based on the entire history of the matter, and at the very maximum the present zoning should in no case be exceeded.

February 3, 1986

• Approved the following street improvements to accommodate feeder buses to the Vienna Metro Station:

- Prohibit left turns from the turning lane on Maple Avenue onto Glyndon Street at appropriate times in order to permit the bus to maneuver that intersection.

- Move back the stop bar on southbound East Street at Maple Avenue.

- Make minor improvements to the Ayr Hill Avenue/Beulah Road intersection if the buses will use this intersection instead of the Beulah/Creek Crossing intersection.

- Reconfigure the island at the intersection of Malcolm Road and Nutley Street to permit the buses to maneuver that turn.

• Approved the site plan, subject to review and approval by the Board of Architectural Review, for the Navy Federal Credit Union building addition, including landscaping and parking areas.

Also approved the installation of light standards 14 feet high, the same as those now installed.

• Requested that Virginia Power install a street light between 1421 and 1423 DeSale St., S.W.

Edith King

The Town of Vienna and its business community lost a friend last month with the death of Edith King, president of Money & King Funeral Home, the town's oldest continuous business.

Mrs. King was born in Hoboken, N.J., on February 16, 1910. In 1934, she married Howard King, grandson of Howard Money who founded the funeral home in 1881. Howard King took over the business in 1946, with Howard Money's daughter Gertrude having a continued interest.

In 1948, the Kings purchased the property at 171 Maple Ave., W., and built the funeral home in operation today, the first two-story business in Vienna. Shortly after the building was completed, Howard King died suddenly on March 27, 1951.

Mrs. King then sold her own successful beauty salon and, with her partner Gertrude Money and manager Dee Crickenberger, carried on the funeral home business, with Chew Davis joining the firm in 1956.

In addition to devoting her strength and compassion to the families served by Money & King, Mrs. King also was an active member of her church and several community organizations, including Zonta and the Business and Professional Women's Club.

A Word About Water

A resident has asked about the safety of drinking water from faucets that are not used regularly.

According to health officials, when water collects in pipes, the chlorine and other treatment chemicals are eventually exhausted, allowing bacteria to form. These bacteria are what cause the stale taste in standing water. Bacteria buildup can be eliminated simply by letting the water run for about a minute before drinking it.

Older homes having lead pipes or soldering may have trace amounts of metal in water that has stood in the pipes. Running the water for a minute will flush these out of the pipes.

A 1966 *Newsletter* reported: "Through the efforts of the Vienna Town Council, the Fairfax County Delegation to the General Assembly secured an amendment to the legislation authorizing county utility taxes which will exempt residents of Vienna from any utility tax imposed by Fairfax County. The Town of Vienna adopted utility legislation some two years ago in lieu of Town personal property taxes.

"It is hoped that if Fairfax County adopts a utility tax it will at the same time repeal personal property taxes on household goods. In the event this is done, Vienna residents will receive a small measure of tax relief."

Registration is ongoing until class begins or reaches maximum enrollment.

Make sure your schedule will allow you to take a class before registering. **NO REFUNDS WILL BE ISSUED UNLESS THE RECREATION DEPARTMENT**

MENT CANCELS OR CHANGES THE SCHEDULE OF A CLASS.

Classes will begin on time and will not wait for tardy students.

Parents should accompany young children to and from the classroom. The Recreation Department has no means of supervising children past class time.
