## Permit Parking Rules Outlined

When the Vienna Metro station opens on June 7, residents may notice a marked increase in the number of commuter vehicles parked on town streets. The Town Council has established procedures by which those living in neighborhoods heavily impacted by commuter parking may petition to have their streets designated for permit parking.

Petitions should be submitted to the Town Manager's office at Town Hall. The Police Department will conduct a survey of the area requested for permit parking to determine whether the following conditions are met:

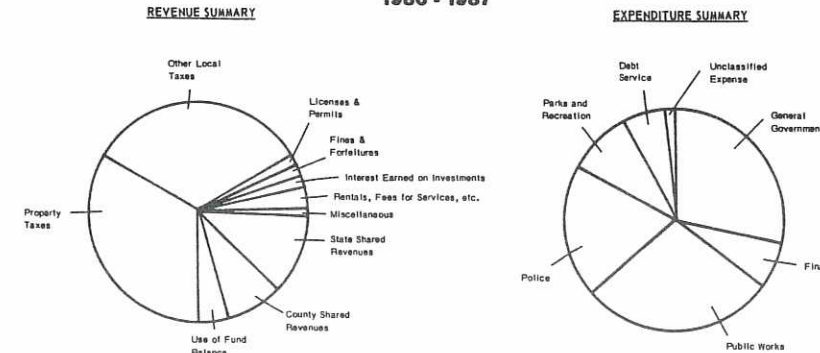
- Average number of commuter vehicles occupies more than 25% of the available parking spaces.

- Total number of vehicles exceeds 75% of the available parking spaces.

The Town Council will then conduct a public hearing on the request. If approved as a permit parking zone, weekday parking in the area will be restricted during set hours to the resi-

## Community Center Addition Approved

Groundbreaking for the addition to the Vienna Community Center, which was approved by the Town Council last month, is planned for September. The addition will include a multipurpose room with a stage and seating for over 200 people, and a full basement for future expansion.

The cost for this addition is now estimated at \$883,000. Community donations from organizations, businesses, and individuals will be needed to provide a first-class facility. The Department of Parks and Recreation will begin a fund-raising drive this summer. Contributions may be made payable to Town of Vienna, 127 Center St., S., Vienna, VA 22180, designated for "Community Center Addition."

increase of \$620,691 or 6.01% over the current budget. It retains the real estate tax rate of 33¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, while proposing significant capital improvements and continuation of all services now provided to citizens.

Water and sewer fund expenses budgeted for FY 1986-87 total \$2,886,371, an increase of \$119,421 or 4.32% over this year. An 11% increase in water rates and a 10% increase in sewer rates are recommended, as well as elimination of the excess use charge for water service, which would have generated approximately \$200,000 in revenue next fiscal year. The new water and sewer rates would still keep Vienna in line with other jurisdictions, while elimination of the excess use charge should reduce the number of customer complaints about their bills and subsequent billing adjustments.

The complete proposed budget is available for review in the Management Services Office at Town Hall.



# Retirement from Council Means New Role

This month I conclude 10 years on the Town Council. They have been rewarding years to me. I have made, hopefully, some friends; and unavoidably and regrettably, but not surprisingly, I have irritated some citizens. But on balance I have felt that I have contributed to a community sense that Vienna's town government — its executive departments and its governing Council — is concerned with protecting and preserving the aspirations of its citizens to live in an ambience as free of the anxieties and irritants of modern life as one can expect to find in a modern metropolis.

I cannot point to any votes of mine which I would now retract. Nor can I recall any votes which I believe were individually significant. But I have a sense that I have consistently followed the platform on which I initially ran, and which I submitted to you on each subsequent election: to maintain the single-family, residential character of Vienna. (That platform is, of course, not unique: every member of Council now serving, and those who have served in past years, have equally adopted it, and have as equally attempted to follow it.)

## Disturbing Questions

But the fact that all of my Council votes meld into a whole, leaving me with a nebulous feeling of satisfaction but with no sense of specific accomplishment, disturbs me. Am I in a rut, without knowing it?

As I walked the streets of Vienna these past 10 years, knocking on your doors, asking your support, a question frequently asked was, "Why are you doing this? Why are you running?" And I never had a good answer.

Now, I am asked, "Why are you retiring?" The answer to that is equally difficult. It is *not* because I am no longer interested, or that I am tired, or in ill health. Quite the contrary I continue to be concerned with Vienna and its future; and my doctor tells me I

have the blood pressure, heart beat, and blood count of a healthy 18-year old. Maybe it's because I want to mow my lawn on weekends; or that I'm tired of neighbors looking askance at my lush crop of dandelions each summer.

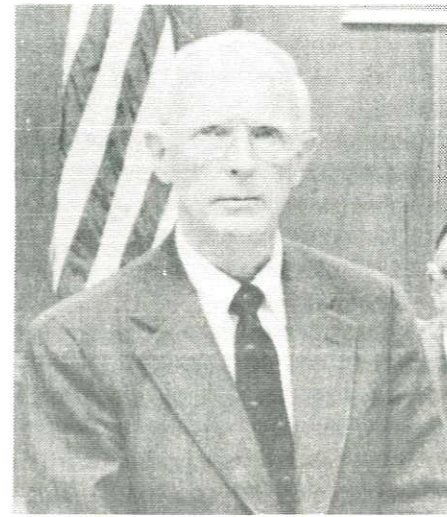
From time to time all of us do well to stop what we are doing; to take a bearing on where we started, and where we are; to recalculate our course and our direction. I think that time has come for me in relation to my Council activities. I would like to have the opportunity to observe the town, its citizens, and its government from a different perspective.

A gentleman for whom I had the greatest admiration and respect, used to regularly attend all our Council meetings. He was not intrusive, and rarely addressed the Council. But he was there, observing all of us, attentive to the issues as they came before us. He died earlier this year. I think that I will take his place in the back row of the Council Chamber. And observe for a time my former colleagues.

## Dedication Impressive

Let me say a few words about them. One of the deepest impressions which I will carry with me is the tremendous dedication which all members of Council with whom I have served have demonstrated. Being on Council brings few rewards, but much expenditure of time and study. Almost every Monday night is taken up with meetings, hearings, or work sessions; almost every weekend requires giving time to understanding the problems which arose the previous week, to citizen complaints or calls for help, or to work sessions of the Council. But all of my fellow Council members have been willing to give of themselves. I have also been impressed by the willingness of our citizens to serve on our various boards and commissions, and by their devotion to Vienna. All of us citizens of Vienna should be aware of those sacrifices, and thankful for the voluntary efforts of so many of our fellow Viennans.

On the other hand my biggest dis-

appointment is that year after year a bare 20% or less of our citizens are willing to express their appreciation for the vitality of our Council and commissions, or to demonstrate an interest in Vienna's governing body by the simple act of voting in our Town elections. This year, out of some 9,000 registered voters only 1,800 voted.

So, while I begin playing the part of observer I intend also to consider how we can increase citizen interest and participation in what is, after all, the heart and soul of the democratic process.

To my family who have tolerated my occasional idiosyncratic behavior; particularly to my wife, Mary, my mainstay and compass — and who now will have to put up with me on weekends, whether she likes it or not; and to those of you who have supported me in my election campaigns, given me encouragement and support, and who have expressed concern over my leaving the Council, my heartfelt thanks.

As you can see, I am not retiring, but merely assuming a different role.

"I'll but lie me down and rest a while; And then I'll rise and fight again."

## Neighborhood Watch Report

The Vienna Police Department showed no significant increase in major crimes during April. The following offenses were reported:

This is a free activity, but reservations are required. Call 528-5406.

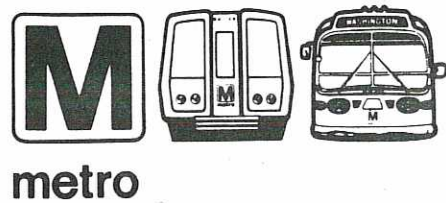

## Vienna, 3 Other Orange Line Stations to Open June 7

The nine-mile, \$240 million extension of the Metrorail Orange Line west of Ballston will open for the first passengers at 8 a.m. Saturday, June 7. The Orange Line extension has four above-ground stations in the median of I-66 in Fairfax and Arlington Counties. Opening day ceremonies are planned as follows:

- 9 a.m. — East Falls Church station
- 10 a.m. — West Falls Church station
- 11 a.m. — Dunn Loring station
- 12 noon — Vienna station

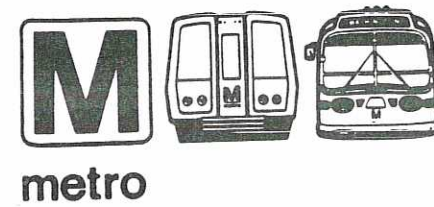
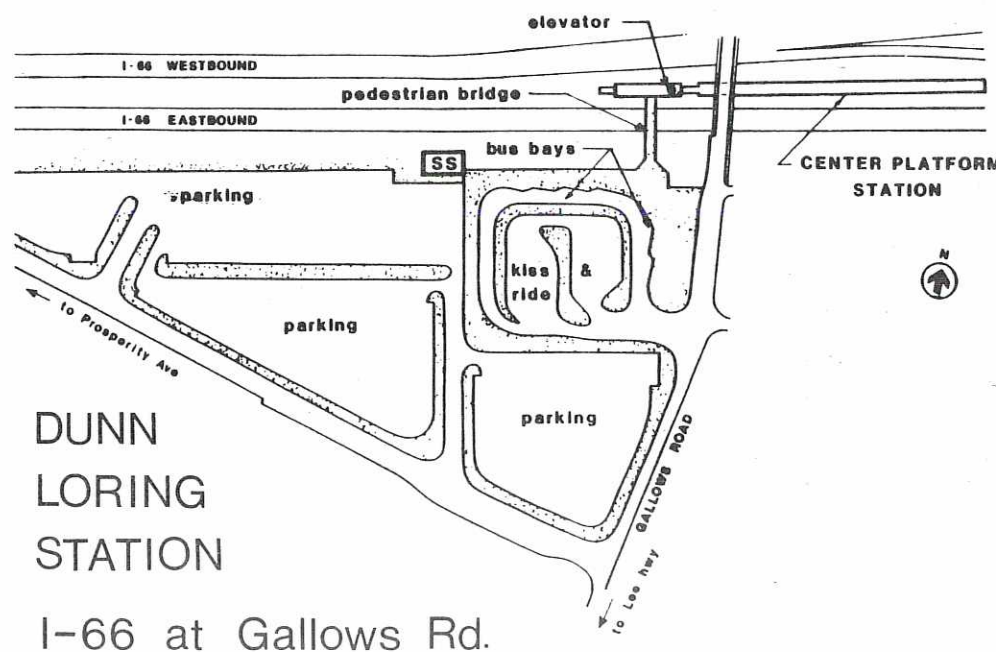
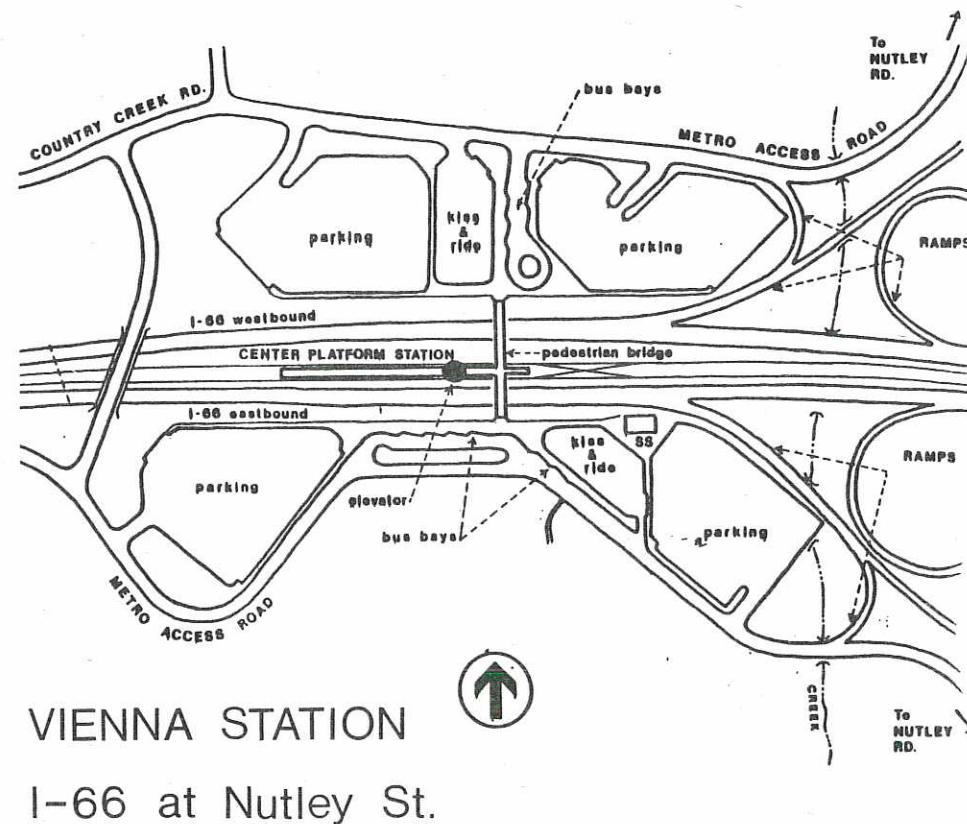
Governor Gerald L. Baliles and other state and local elected officials, including Vienna Mayor Charles Robinson, have been invited to speak at the ceremonies.

Opening day activities will also include entertainment, food sales, and information on how to use Metro. Free one-way rides from each of the new stations to any other station in the Metro system will be offered between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. June 7 only. Passengers will receive free one-way tickets when they enter the new stations and surrender them when leaving. After 4 p.m., standard fares will be charged.

The Orange Line extension marks the completion of the second of five planned Metrorail lines. The Blue Line was completed to Huntington in 1983. The next Metro extension will be the Red Line from Silver Spring to Wheaton in 1990. With the completion of the Orange Line, the Metrorail system is 70 miles long with 64 operating stations. The system is planned to be 103 miles long with 86 operating stations.

Ridership on the Orange Line extension is projected to be approximately 24,000 trips a day by next fall. Total Metrorail ridership hit a record high during the week of April 7 with 469,912 trips.

### HOURS OF SERVICE

Metrorail service hours are 6 a.m. to midnight weekdays, 8 a.m. to midnight Saturdays, and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sundays. Beginning July 6, Sunday service hours will be 10 a.m. to midnight. Orange Line trains will operate every six minutes during rush hours and every 12 minutes during non-rush hours.

Orange Line passengers may transfer to the Blue Line at any station between Rosslyn and Stadium-Armory. The Orange Line crosses the Red Line at Metro Center and the Yellow Line at L'Enfant Plaza.

### FARES

Fares are based on distance traveled. Rush hour fares range from 80¢ to \$2.40, depending on the length of the trip. Non-rush hour fares are 80¢, \$1, or \$1.10, depending on the length of the trip. Elderly and handicapped



Residents may be curious about the small "Fastran" buses that have appeared on town streets. Fastran is a special transportation service of the Fairfax County government for the elderly, the disabled, and those with limited income.

- Fastran provides transportation for:
- Medical appointments;
  - Weekly shopping for groceries and other essential needs;
  - Persons receiving training through the Job Training Partnership Act;
  - Chartered group recreational trips.

These services are available weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Reservations are required for all rides.

Certification of eligibility is necessary to ride Fastran. Fastran information brochures containing application forms are available at Town Hall, or call the Fairfax County Office of Information and Referral at 691-3253.

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riders pay half the corresponding rush hour fare, with a maximum of 80¢ per trip. Rush hour fares are in effect from 6 to 9:30 a.m. and 3 to 6:30 p.m. weekdays except holidays.

### PARKING

Opening of the Orange Line extension adds about 4,600 all day parking spaces to the Metrorail system. Parking fees are \$1.25 per day at East and West Falls Church and \$1 at Dunn Loring and Vienna. Fees are collected on exit between 3 and 10 p.m. Parking is free on weekends and holidays.

Short-term parking is provided at the Kiss & Ride area of each station between 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. and after 7 p.m. weekdays. The fee is 75¢ for 90 minutes.

### BIKE & RIDE FACILITIES

The Orange Line stations have bicycle and motorcycle parking facilities. Bicyclists who obtain permits from Metro may take their bikes on the trains weekdays after 7 p.m. and on weekends except certain holidays. For information about the Bike on Rail program, call 962-1327.

## Feeder Buses Serve Stations

On Sunday, June 22, many Metrobus routes in Northern Virginia will be discontinued and new routes established to complement the opening of the four new Orange Line Metrorail stations. In Vienna, Route 2P/2X will provide weekday rush hour service.

Fares will be 80¢ for a one-way ride and \$1.25 for a round trip with a Metrorail transfer.

Route 2P will operate between the Vienna and Dunn Loring Metro stations via Nutley Street, Tapawingo Road, Cottage Street, Moore Avenue, Park Street, Cedar Lane, Bowling Green Drive, Cottage Street, and Gallows Road. Buses will operate every 30 minutes from Vienna to Dunn Loring from 5:59 to 8:45 a.m. and in the reverse direction from 4:22 to 7:08 p.m.
