Halloween Parade October 29th

The 40th annual Vienna Halloween Parade will step off at 7 p.m. Wednesday, October 29. The parade theme is "Vienna's Salute to Liberty" in honor of the 100th anniversary of the dedication of the Statue of Liberty in October 1886.

Lori Jo Smith, America's Junior Miss, will be Grand Marshal of the parade, which will feature marching bands, colorful floats, military units, antique cars, horses, cartoon characters, and many youth and adult specialty groups. David Haines of WAVA radio will emcee the parade from the VIP reviewing stand on the Southern States parking lot.

The parade will begin at Maple Avenue, follow Maple to Courthouse Road, turn left on Courthouse and left again on Locust Street to disband on Waters Field.

The Halloween Parade is sponsored by the Greater Vienna Chamber of Commerce and the Vienna Jaycees in cooperation with the Town of Vienna. For parade information, call the Chamber of Commerce at 281-1333.

ATTENTION MOTORISTS – Because of the Halloween Parade, Maple Avenue will be closed between Beulah Road and Lawyers Road on October 29 from approximately 6:45 p.m. until the conclusion of the parade.

The Town Council will hold a public hearing on Monday, October 27, on an application to rezone the properties on the south side of Maple Avenue between East Street and Follin Lane. The hearing will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. All interested citizens are encouraged to attend.

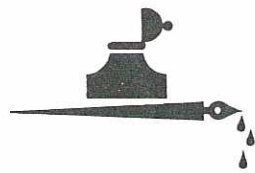
The application requests C-1 commercial zoning for 615, 621 and 627 Maple Ave., E., and 106 East St., S.E. These properties are currently zoned RS-16 single-family residential.

A retail/office complex, to be known as Vienna Gateway Center, is proposed for the site. Citizens may review the plans in the office of the Zoning Administrator at Town Hall.

Town Council Action . . .

AUGUST 18, 1986

- Requested the Town Manager to prepare a report on the cost of installing three speed humps on Broadleaf Drive, N.E. Directed traffic law enforcement for the entire town, especially speeding and stop sign surveillance, to be significantly intensified.
- Requested Fairfax County to install street lights in the 700 block of Spring Street, S.E., and on Church Street, N.E., at lots 24A and 49A of Council Square.
- Ordered an appraisal of the strip of Town-owned land on Abbotsford Drive. The appraisal is to be paid for by the owner of the adjacent property at 1916 Abbotsford Dr., who has requested to purchase the Town land.
- Requested the Town Manager to provide Council with complete plans and specifications for a one-story addition to the Vienna Community Center, with basement, and to arrange a meeting with the architect. Granted a variance for 49% lot coverage for the building and parking lot.
- Took no action on a request to donate an advertisement in a Virginia Special Olympics publication.
- Approved the expenditure of up to \$220,000 from restricted water and sewer funds for sanitary sewer line inspection, grouting and replacement.
- Authorized Town participation in the State Department of Taxation's Set-off Debt Program for 1986-87.
- Directed publication and recording with the Fairfax County Treasurer of the delinquent real estate tax list. Those taxes that have been delinquent for three years will be recorded as liens against the properties.
- Accepted the following bids:
 - \$34,915.04 by Owens & Dove, Inc., Merrifield, for water system improvements at Electric Avenue and Follin Lane.
 - Bid by American Uniform Sales, Alexandria, for police uniforms.
 - \$22,590.00 by Central Motor Co. for a truck, cab and chassis with single axle.
 - \$4,075 by S.J. Meeks Son, Inc., for a nine-foot dump body and hoist.
 - \$58,000 by Mid Atlantic Equipment Co. for a rubber-tired loader.
 - \$7,582.30 by John C. Louis Co., Inc., Fairfax, for a leaf loader - trailer mounted.
 - Approved a negotiated contract of \$108,615.18 with APAC, Chantilly, for asphalt. No regular bids were received.
- Set October 27 as the date for a public hearing on a request to rezone the properties at 106 East St., S.E., and

615, 621 and 627 Maple Ave., E., from RS-16 single-family residential to C-1 commercial.

- Approved the position of Public Works Parts Clerk at pay grade 4, instead of grade 3 as approved earlier.
- Requested the Transportation Safety Commission to investigate the possibility of installing traffic control signals on Beulah Road to slow traffic and provide a safe opportunity for vehicles to cross Beulah at Church Street and Ayr Hill Avenue.

SEPTEMBER 8, 1986

- Took no action on a request by Vienna Villager Condominium Association concerning weeds, trash pickup and other matters, since no one was present to represent the association.
- Accepted an offer from William Gunst, 1916 Abbotsford Dr., to purchase a strip of Town property adjoining his for a net price of \$2,500 plus closing costs.
- Authorized replacement of street signs in town with new green and white signs.
- Adopted a resolution concerning the flow of truck traffic between Routes 29 and 123, specifically the proposed prohibition of trucks on Blake Lane.
- Set November 10 for a public hearing on a proposed ordinance to require maintenance of items shown on original site plans in commercial areas.
- Approved the installation of a traffic signal at Church Street and Beulah Road at a cost of approximately \$25,000 to \$35,000, funds to come from contingency reserve. The signal will be mounted with poles and cables instead of aluminum mast arms.
- Referred several recommendations for short-term traffic improvements in the Maple Avenue corridor to the Transportation Safety Commission for review and comment. Council also asked the Commission to review the entire Town Traffic Study and report back within 90 days.
- Accepted the following bids:
 - \$69,450 by Cues, Inc., Orlando, Florida, for the lease/purchase of a multi-conductor TV/manual seal trailer.
 - \$56,500 by Dome Corp. of America, Montclair, N.J., for a salt dome.
 - \$12.50/cubic yard by Stump Dump Inc. for hauling and disposal of Fall/Spring Clean-up debris.

Scout to Paint House Numbers

During the month of October, Vienna resident Thomas Franklin of Boy Scout Troop 1983 will lead a small group in stenciling house numbers on the curbs in front of over 200 homes within the town limits.

This Eagle Scout service project has been endorsed by the Town Manager and the Chief of Police. The Town will furnish paint and other necessary supplies. There is no charge to homeowners.

Homes were selected to receive this service based on Police Department recommendations. The easily readable house numbers will help police and the fire department identify addresses in response to emergency calls.

Personal Property

The Fairfax County Office of Assessments is now sending notifications to advise taxpayers to file personal property returns on motor vehicles.

Vehicles newly purchased or brought into Fairfax County from another state and titled in Virginia are being reported each week to Fairfax County by the State Department of Motor Vehicles. Letters are then mailed to the vehicle owners by the County, alerting them of the requirement to file personal property tax returns in a timely manner to avoid late filing penalties.

With look-alike and designer drugs and widespread use of cocaine, the drug abuse problem is increasingly complex. "Drugs in the Eighties" is a state-of-the-art look at today's drug scene.

"Diagnosis: Teen Alcoholic" is a practical look at current risks, danger signs of teenage alcoholism and gives treatment options.

"Teen Suicide" identifies and explains warning signals to parents and peers so that action may be taken in time to stop a useless death.

Fire Prevention Week Oct. 5-11

Fire Prevention Week marks the anniversary of the "Great Chicago Fire" of 1871, which killed 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed 17,430 buildings, and blackened 2,100 acres at a cost of \$168 million.

President Warren G. Harding proclaimed the first Fire Prevention Week in 1922 to be observed "by every man, woman, and child, not only during the week designated in this pronouncement but throughout every hour of every day of the year."

Fire Prevention Week will be observed October 5-11 this year, and Fairfax County has adopted the theme "A Dead Battery Is a Real Killer." This theme was chosen to increase citizen awareness of smoke detector maintenance and testing programs.

All Fairfax County Fire and Rescue stations will be holding open house on Saturday, October 11, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Station tours, equipment demonstrations, fire safety presentations, and fire safety literature will be featured during the open house.

Fall Cleanup Begins October 6

The Fall Cleanup begins October 6 in northwest Vienna. Cleanup crews will then move on to the northeast quadrant on October 10, southeast on October 15, and southwest on October 24.

Residents are reminded not to place cleanup items at the curbside more than a week prior to the starting date for each quadrant.

During the cleanup, household discards and debris placed at the curbside will be picked up free of charge by Department of Public Works crews. The only limitations are as follows:

- Each residence is limited to 300 pounds each of concrete and scrap metal.
- Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.
- Only two major appliances may be discarded per residence.
- Leaves will not be picked up by cleanup crews.

• No debris of any kind may be brought in from outside of town for pickup.

Please separate brush and branches from other discards and keep all cleanup items away from regular trash, fire hydrants, water meters, utility poles, gas valves and fences.

Because cleanup crews comprise the same personnel who perform street maintenance and other public works duties, there is time for only one cleanup sweep in each quadrant of town. Crews cannot double back along the cleanup route.

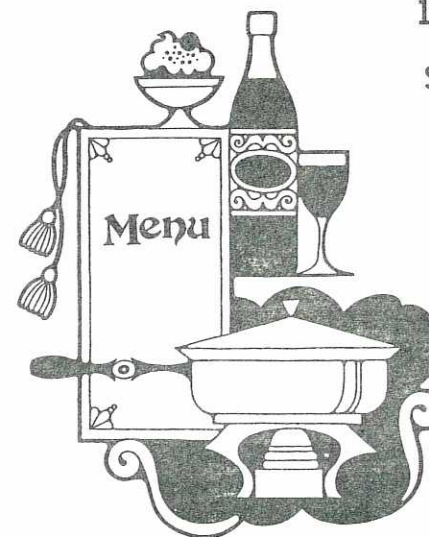

County to Test Home Radon Levels

Fairfax County's Environmental Health staff will be conducting radon studies in homes this winter and next winter. The service will begin about December 1 and will be available to residents of Fairfax County, including the Town of Vienna.

The program is two-fold: approximately 600 homes will be tested based on homeowner requests and approximately 600 more homes will be selected based on the geological formation on which the home is located.

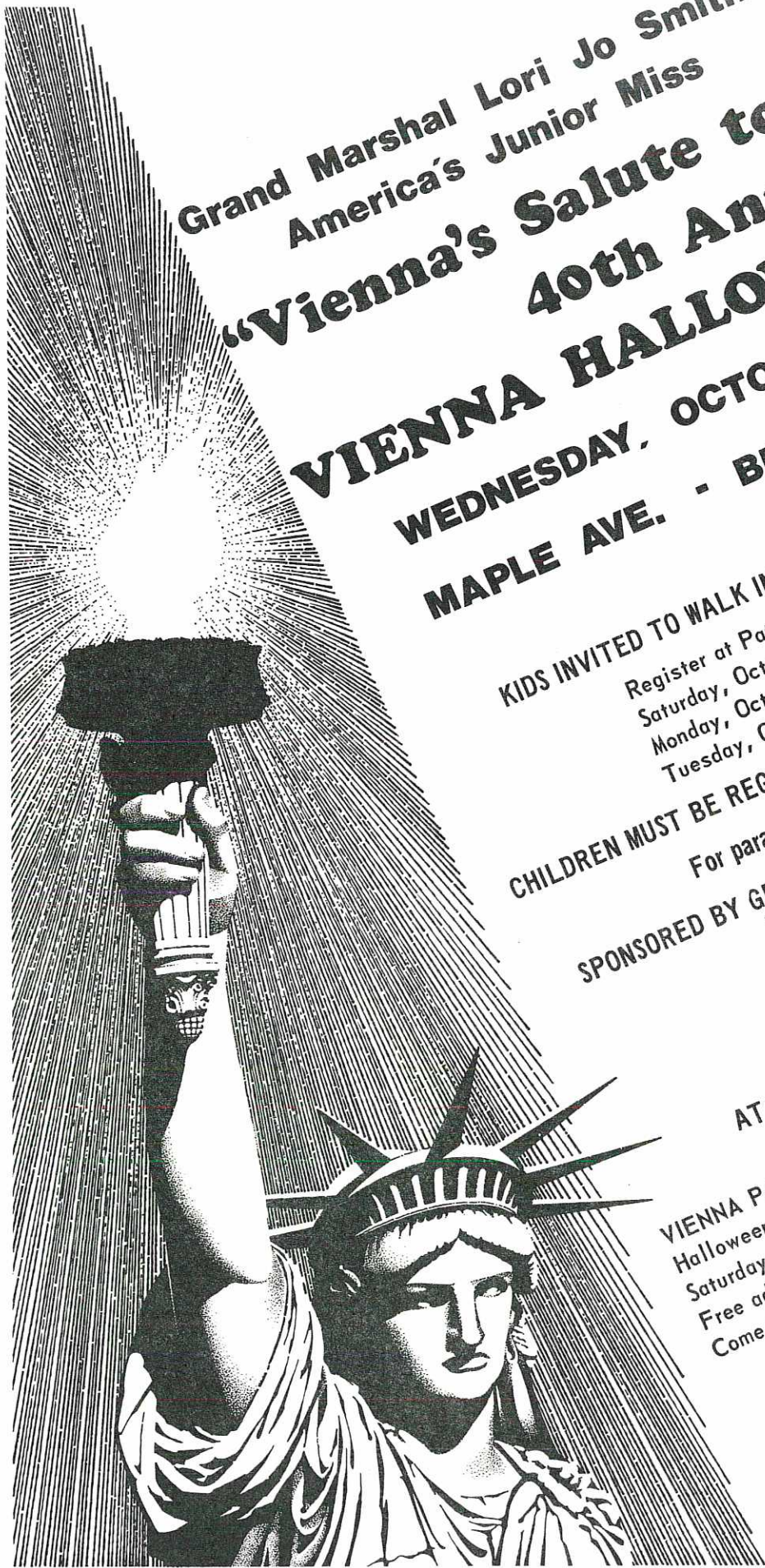
Homes to be tested will be mailed a test kit with instructions for the placement of the kit and return mailing. If test results are above recommended levels, additional tests will be made in the home. Where radon levels continue to exceed the recommended levels, surveys of the homes may be made by County staff or homeowners referred to companies that survey homes and recommend methods of reducing the radon level.

Vienna residents who wish to participate in this voluntary program may contact the Environmental Health Division after October 1. Call 246-5525. Depending on the response, not all requests may be honored since the total number will be structured to include homes in all areas of the county.

Council Approves New Street Signs

The August *Newsletter* asked citizens to comment on new street signs at three intersections along Maple Avenue: Park Street, Center Street and Lawyers Road. Based on the comments received, the Town Council has approved installation of the new signs throughout Vienna.

The signs are green with white lettering and a white border. Signs along Maple Avenue will be installed as soon as possible and on the other streets in town as old signs need replacing.

Are You Registered to Vote?

Last-minute voter registration for the November 4 general election is scheduled at Patrick Henry Library on the following dates: Wednesday, October 1, from 3 to 9 p.m.; Thursday, October 2, from 7 to 9 p.m.; and Saturday, October 4, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Registration books close October 4 and reopen November 5.

TWO BOND ISSUES ON BALLOT

In the General Election on Tuesday, November 4, Fairfax County voters will decide two bond referenda. A school bond referendum proposes the issuance of \$146.12 million in Fairfax County general obligation bonds to fund school improvements and construction. A \$20 million neighborhood improvement program bond referendum would be used to finance the construction and reconstruction of streets and sidewalks in the county.

Members of the Fairfax County Task Force on the 1986 Bond Referendum are available to address community organizations concerning these bond referendum issues. To schedule a speaker, or for more information, call 691-3187 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Nancy Ruff is the Centreville District Citizen Chairperson for the school bond referendum, and she will discuss with groups in Vienna what the school bond funds would mean to ensuring completion of improvements to James Madison High School and other schools serving the town.

CONSTITUTIONAL QUESTIONS

Voters will also be asked November 4 to decide on four Virginia Constitutional amendments. One amendment would allow a person who has failed to vote for four consecutive years to remain registered by indicating in writing a desire to do so. The person must reside at the same address under which currently regis-

tered in order to be eligible to use this procedure.

A second amendment would authorize the Virginia Supreme Court to directly answer questions of state law referred by either a federal court or the highest appellate court of another state, thereby avoiding the more cumbersome and expensive procedure of requiring litigants to bring separate actions in Virginia courts to resolve questions of Virginia law which have arisen in those out-of-state courts.

Another amendment would authorize review by appellate courts of preliminary circuit court rulings which would otherwise result in the dismissal of the accused or suppression of evidence essential to the Commonwealth's case prior to a trial on the merits of the case. This limited exception to the constitutional prohibition against appeals by the Commonwealth was proposed in response to a number of criminal cases in which charges have been dismissed or evidence excluded by circuit court judges in hearings preliminary to trial.

The final amendment would allow federal, state and local government employees, except those who are elected or who are employed by an elected official, to be appointed assistant voter registrars or officers of election.
