## Hearings on Lot Size, Water Rates

At its May 23 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposal to delete provisions in the Town Code allowing for lot averaging in subdivisions. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in Town Hall.

In the 1960's, lot averaging was incorporated into the Code to allow flexibility when the town was developing and contained much open land. In RS-16 zones, subdivided lots are required to average 16,000 square feet with a minimum lot area of 14,000 square feet. In RS-12.5 zones, subdivisions must average 12,500 square feet per lot with a minimum lot size of 10,500 square feet.

Because the town no longer contains much open space, it has been proposed that provision for lot averaging be removed from the Code to decrease the number of houses per subdivision.

Also at the May 23 meeting, a public hearing will be held on proposed increases in water and sewer rate fees. These increases have been proposed to meet annual operating expenses and reduce accumulated deficits to keep the water and sewer fund in sound financial condition.

If approved, the water rate would increase from \$1.02 to \$1.12 per 1,000 gallons for town residents and from \$1.36 to \$1.50 for out-of-town customers. The sewer rate for all customers would rise from \$2.10 to \$2.31 per 1,000 gallons. In addition, the account service charge would go from \$3 to \$4 per quarter.

## New Law Restricts Inoperative Autos

The Town Council has adopted an ordinance to restrict keeping of inoperative motor vehicles. An inoperative vehicle is defined as one not in operating condition, partially or totally disassembled for 60 days or longer, or not displaying valid license plates and inspection decal.


The new ordinance permits a property owner to store one inoperative vehicle outdoors on the property for the purpose of restoration for a period not to exceed six months, after first obtaining from the Town a special stored vehicle license plate and payment of a \$50 fee.

Vehicles kept in violation of this ordinance may be removed by the Town at the owner's expense if the owner, after reasonable notice, has failed to do so.

Inoperative vehicles may be kept without a storage tag only if housed in a fully enclosed structure.



## Police Calls Increased in 1987

In 1987, calls for service to the Vienna Police Department increased by 44% over 1986. The greatest increase was in the area of traffic complaints, which rose 50.7%.

Last year, police issued tickets for 1,859 radar violations and 5,392 other traffic offenses. In addition, 109 driv-

ing while intoxicated arrests were made.

During 1987, there was a 7.5% decrease in traffic accidents. Police responded to a total of 586 accidents compared to 630 in 1986.

Of major concern to the Vienna Police Department, narcotics related offenses increased by 40%.

## Homes Sold Require Smoke Detectors

In accordance with a Fairfax County ordinance, all residential buildings and homes in the county that have changed hands (sold, leased or rented) since March 1, 1985, are required to have smoke detectors near sleeping areas and in basements.

The ordinance requires owners of homes and residential buildings, or the owner's agent, to maintain smoke detectors in good working order. Tenants are responsible for reasonable care of all detectors, including change of battery when necessary and interim testing. The tenant must provide written notice to the owner or agent for repair of any malfunctioning detectors.

Beginning in 1975, builders were required under the Statewide Building Code to install smoke detectors in all residential buildings and single-family homes constructed in the county. Since July 1, 1982, smoke detectors have also been required in multi-family buildings containing four or more units and in hotels and motels. However, residences built before 1975 do not fall under the purview of the ordinance

unless they now change hands.

The County Building Inspectors Office is authorized to enforce this ordinance. For more information, call 246-2748.

## Citizen Comment

### Final Words on Spring Cleanup Program

*As this year's Spring Cleanup winds up this month, here are some final comments on the program.*

*From Hillcrest Drive, S.W.:*

Being a resident of Vienna for over 25 years, I feel that we should keep our Spring Cleanup as well as the Fall. We need both of them.

We in this area are truly blessed to have these services. The Town has done a wonderful job, not only picking up and distributing those useful items that are so much needed, but also in picking up and disposing of those no longer in use, not to mention the piles of limbs, discards and tons of debris that accumulate from time to time.

If everyone would abide by the Cleanup schedule, only a small segment of the town would be cluttered at a time, and the majority of residents who appreciate the Spring Cleanup could also appreciate the beauty of spring in Vienna.

*From Hillside Circle:*

The debate over the accumulation of debris at the curb in anticipation of the Spring Cleanup crew, versus the enjoyment of the beauty of spring flowers from each other's yards, and the showing off thereof to visitors, has reached a point of fruitless either/or. The baby is being thrown out with the bathwater.

I quite agree that debris is unsightly, and not pleasant to view. It should certainly not be allowed to sit there for weeks or even days. The fact that the Cleanup comes in the spring as well as the fall, however, is somewhat beside the point, for there are flowers all through the summer and, for those who have the energy, time and desire, there are also attractive floral displays in the fall that would also be obscured by debris if allowed to lie there. I don't suppose the suggestion is also to do away with the Fall Clean-

up, lest it disturb our enjoyment of floral beauty? Perhaps it is.

While we all enjoy a beautiful Vienna, old and new residents alike, and while I know that our administration is dedicated to supporting and doing all it can to ensure such beauty in our town, I believe that its primary responsibility is to provide all its residents with needed services, including the Cleanup. To remove such a service at the insistence of those who are willing to "pay" for the enjoyment of others' gardens by preventing their community from having that service is to give us less rather than more service and support.

*From Yeonas Drive, S.W.:*

I am a life-long resident of Vienna, having grown up on Moore Avenue when it was known as Ustanali Street. I am amazed when I read the *Newsletter* to find people objecting to the Spring Cleanup. I feel these same people would be loudest to complain if all this trash were left lying around their neighbors' yards all summer.

I would rather put up with the mess a few weeks than have to look at it all summer. Do they have some magic way of making large limbs and winter debris disappear? If so, they owe it to the rest of us to let us know their secret.

My visitors have always been impressed by our neat, clean town, as well as our special services such as Spring and Fall Cleanups. Not everyone can afford to have old appliances and extra trash picked up throughout the year. Let's be more considerate of those people. Let's keep Vienna the unique town it has always been.

*From Branch Road, S.E.:*

It is obvious that if you don't have a problem you can complain, but the people with storm damage and overgrowth prunings necessary to keep Vienna beautiful must have some source of relief. If everyone had a pickup truck,

they could haul their trash to the dump. If you live in an apartment, you have no problem and can freely complain. If you cut down your shubbery and trees, you are also free to complain.

The problem is the premature stacking of prunings and trash at the curbside before the scheduled pickup. Why not assess a fine or, better yet, contract with a non-Town organization to pick up the trash at the violators' expense.

Continue the scheduled pickups with a specified schedule for placing trash at curbside.

*From Polly Street, S.E.:*

Vienna is a "green" town, and all those lovely trees and shrubs beget an awful lot of trash each spring. I have 30 trees on my property plus a number of shrubs and bushes. I have about one truckload of branches and cuttings to dispose of.

Is Vienna going to look prettier if I hold that till fall? I would suggest something other than stopping the Spring Cleanup. Perhaps the quadrants of the town could be subdivided and each area be given a shorter window of opportunity in which to get out the trash. The W&OD Trail splits southeast Vienna fairly well and Tapawingo Road does the same for southwest.

Don't cut out the Spring Cleanup.

## Voting Is Easy on Electronic Ballot

In this year's Town election, votes will be cast on new electronic voting machines. These are the same type of machines used in last month's County bond referendum and in the March presidential primary.

To cast your vote:

1. Part curtains, enter machine and drop curtains behind you.

2. Blinking red lights on the ballot indicate the office for which you may vote.

3. To vote for the candidate of your choice, push the square next to the candidate's name. A solid red light will appear.

4. If you change your mind, push the lit square again, the blinking light will reappear and you may make a new selection.

5. Vote for each office in the same manner as described in number 3.

6. After you have made all your selections, press the green "VOTE" button in the lower right corner of the ballot to record your vote.

7. Part the curtains and leave the voting machine.

A Town election official will be at the Vienna Community Center on May 7, the Saturday before the election, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. to show the new machine to interested voters.

A low-cost rabies vaccination clinic for dogs and cats will be held at the Vienna Community Center on Sunday, May 22, from noon until 2 p.m. All dogs and cats over six months old are required to be vaccinated.

Vaccine for dogs and cats four months to a year old costs \$4 for a one-year shot. For animals over a year old, the cost is \$6 for a three-year shot. Certificates will be given to pet owners at the clinic to verify each vaccination. Both Town of Vienna and Fairfax County dog tags will be sold at the clinic.

In bringing animals to the clinic, dogs should be on a leash and cats confined to a cage or box, or wrapped in a towel.
