Mayor and Chief at Your Service: Mental Health and Suicide Prevention for our Youth

Tuesday, Sept. 10, 7 p.m. • Vienna Police Department Community Room

n this eye-opening, public forum, Mayor Linda Colbert and Police Chief Jim Morris lead a discussion on a growing problem in the Vienna community - adolescent, and teen mental health concerns. The Eric Monday Foundation and Fairfax County Community Services Board representatives will be on hand to highlight the pressures young athletes and other middle and high school students face, how to spot the warning signs of a mental health problem, interventional resources available to help families address these health concerns, and the importance of engaging in open conversations about mental health. The police department's newest K-9, a therapy dog, Marlin, will also be on hand to help demonstrate how a supportive environment can help take down the stigma and foster courageous conversations about mental health.

Violent Online Groups Target Minors

Posting or direct messaging images and videos on social media, dating apps and other online sites may seem harmless, but the FBI warns that malicious groups are using such content for criminal activity. These groups are highly manipulative and target victims between the ages of 8 and 17 years old especially those who struggle with a variety of mental health issues, such as depression and suicidal tendencies.

The groups use extortion and blackmail threats to manipulate minors into producing inappropriate material they then use to further blackmail the victim. The violent online groups use many names, including 676, 764, CVLT, Court, Kaskar, Harm Nation, Leak Society, and H3ll, but continuously evolve and form subgroups under different names. They operate on publicly available platforms, such as social media sites or mobile applications.

To help avoid being targeted, it is especially important for parents to monitor their children's online activity and to educate them about the risks associated with sharing personal content:

- Be cautious when posting online, as content can be captured and distributed by malicious actors without consent.
- Regularly search for personal information online to monitor exposure.
- Set privacy settings on social media and use reverse image search to track unauthorized content.
- Be cautious when interacting with strangers online and secure your accounts with strong passwords and multi-factor authentication.
- Research the privacy policies of social media platforms before sharing personal content.

Parents should also know the warning signs of potential self-harm including:

• Behavior changes, such as becoming withdrawn, moody or irritable.

- Significant changes in sleeping or eating habits.
- Unkempt appearance.
- Fresh cuts, bruises, burns or other wounds.
- Threatening to commit suicide or openly talking about not being wanted or needed, or death and not being around.

If you are concerned about your child's mental health, or suspect self-harm or suicidal thoughts, consult with your family doctor or health care provider for an initial evaluation or a referral to a mental health professional. If you believe you have been targeted with this type of crime, report it to the Vienna Police Department.



When Disaster Strikes -Are You Prepared?



rom derechos and tornados to blizzards, earthquakes, and fires, statistics show an uptick in natural disasters and other emergencies in recent years, and while more than 75% of Americans who responded to a nationwide survey report having supplies set aside for disasters, fewer than 50% have a household emergency plan. September is National **Emergency Preparedness** Month, which encourages everyone to be prepared for

disasters and emergencies not just in September, peak hurricane season, but all year long. That's because in some situations, it may be days before help can arrive.

"In widespread emergencies such as a hurricane or tornado, we have to prioritize calls, and we may not be able to respond right away to some situations because we just have too many calls for service, or because weather conditions, such as a blizzard, hinder our response time," said Vienna Police Chief Jim Morris. "That's why it's important for residents and businesses to be prepared to go it alone until help can arrive."

National Emergency Preparedness Month encourages individuals to stock an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and make sure everyone in your household knows the plan and what to do in the event of an emergency. Public safety experts advise that this should be done now, before an emergency hits, using the following three steps:

Assess your needs. Everyone has unique needs. Whether you care for pets, have children, have a medical condition or a disability, it is important to know what your family will need to stay safe.

Make a plan. Once you've assessed your needs, you can plan for what you'd do, where you'd go and what to bring if a disaster strikes. Your emergency supply kit should include items that meet your individual needs. And be sure to sign up for local emergency alerts at www.viennava.gov/alerts.

Engage your support network. Get to know your neighbors because they, along with your family and friends, can be a support network before, during and after a disaster by providing emotional and practical support.

Town Roundabout Keeps Traffic Moving

any Vienna residents can recall the days when gridlock plagued the intersection of Park and Locust Streets at rush hour. The pre-roundabout intersection was a true test of patience as motorists attempting to turn left from Locust onto Park waited hopefully at the stop sign for a break in traffic to proceed home from a long day of work.

A roundabout installed in 2016 was designed to keep traffic moving while also improving bicyclist and pedestrian safety. Vienna Police Chief Jim Morris says the traffic feature took some getting used to at first, but once motorists learned how to navigate the roundabout, traffic flow improved and continues to move well with no major problems reported.

Now that school is back in session and more people are returning to the office after pandemic-related teleworking or hybrid schedules, traffic volume is ticking up toward pre-pandemic levels. So, it seems like a good time for a refresher on how to navigate this special traffic feature.

The Federal Highway Administration provides the following tips for navigating roundabouts:

- Traffic flows in a counterclockwise direction around a center island.
- Slow down as you approach the roundabout, yielding to pedestrians who may be in the crosswalk.
- Yield to any vehicles already in the roundabout. As there is a suitable gap in traffic, enter the roundabout at the dashed entry line.
- Continue around the center island in a counterclockwise direction and do not stop in the roundabout.
- Signal to proceed out of the roundabout at your exit, again yielding to any pedestrians in the crosswalk.
- Bicyclists may use the roundabout, obeying the same rules of the road as motor vehicles or they may proceed along a side path and cross at marked pedestrian crosswalks.
- Using the crosswalk, pedestrians cross the first direction of traffic to the splitter median, wait for vehicles approaching from the other direction, and then finish crossing to the other side of the road.

Longtime Architect Member of the BAR Steps Down

or nearly 30 years, Paul Layer has served the Town of Vienna in many volunteer leadership roles. His experience as a professional architect served the Town well as he guided many local projects as a member of the Board of Architectural Review (BAR) from 2000 to 2024. He was recognized with a Mayor's Volunteer Award in 2018 for his work to help start the process of doing visual design guidelines for the Maple Avenue corridor. He was also instrumental in setting the Church Street design standards through his work on the award-winning Church Street Vision Plan, which was approved by the Vienna Town Council in 1999.

"With direction from the Vienna Town Council and the Town Business Liaison Committee, our sub-committee's goal was to reestablish the Church Street commercial corridor as a Town center with urban architecture that is reminiscent of the small-town American streetscape of the late 19th and early 20th century," Layer said enthusiastically. "With any project, I always try to work toward consensus if I can, and because we worked collaboratively and cooperatively as a team, we were able to accomplish wonderful things with the Church Street vision."

Originally called Georgetown Road, Church Street was the town's first thoroughfare,

hosting the first business district and most of Vienna's churches. The Church Street Vision Project encouraged private property owners to develop, renovate and/or improve their properties in a way that fostered a pedestrian-friendly commercial corridor with a unique architectural theme. With recommendations from the Church Street Vision sub-committee, the Vienna Town Council adopted the zoning code changes that led to the historically themed streetscape that now serves as a welcoming atmosphere for both day-today business and beloved Town events.

Layer decided to step down from the Board of Architectural review earlier this year, and Mayor Linda Colbert recognized him for his decades of service. As he reflected on his work, he also expressed appreciation for the sense of community that attracted him to Vienna years ago.

"I grew up in a small town in Pennsylvania, and there was no central area of any kind," he recalled. "Vienna has a central, walkable town center that contributes to the sense of community here, and that's very special."

Layer is well-versed in Vienna's architectural history, which influenced his design recommendations, including his own design of two buildings in the 100 block of Church Street, NW.

"I am deeply grateful for being given the opportunity to contribute to the town's ongoing development over the years," he said with appreciation. "It has been a truly rewarding experience." \checkmark



Of Bambi, Bamboo, and Bittersweet

hat do these three living things have in common? They are all common organisms in our area that displace

native flora and fauna. And they are not the only three invaders. Invasives, both plants and animals, are becoming more than a nuisance. Deer, for example, not only love hosta salad, but they also eat the undergrowth in natural woodland areas like Northside Park. If allowed to continue unabated, these hungry deer will wipe out the saplings and plants needed to become the tree canopy of the future. Overpopulation also leads to disease and hunger within the herd, and they threaten human health, too. We've seen an increase in traffic accidents involving deer on neighborhood streets in recent years. Deer are also often harbingers of deer ticks, which carry lyme disease, and may be carried and dropped into your yard as deer pass through. While other nearby jurisdictions have established deer population management programs, Vienna has none. Consequently, we are a deer sanctuary island within a sea of deer population control.

Bamboo is another invasive that threatens the environment. Once established, bamboo will spread into public areas and neighbors' lawns. Because bamboo root systems can burrow several feet deep, normal landscape barriers are of little use. I have seen bamboo also spreading into our natural woodland areas.

Oriental bitterweet, ivy, kudzu and other vine-like plants, have become all too common in our area. These plants envelope healthy natives and hasten their demise. And because of deer overpopulation, the next generation of trees are not there to take their place.

"We need to understand the threat that these species pose to our green spaces and to human safety, and know what options we have for countering them."

None of these invasive species are easy to control. But as stewards of Vienna's parks and green spaces, the Town Council, I believe, has a responsibility to educate ourselves on the problem, and search for possible solutions. We need to understand the threat that these species pose to our green spaces and to human safety, and know what options we have for countering them. Most likely, none of those options are cheap or easy, but we need to tackle this issue now so that human health and natural green spaces can be protected for future generations.
