WHY VOTING IS IMPORTANT

Today, most American citizens over the age of 18 are entitled to vote in federal and state elections, but voting was not always a default right for all Americans. The United States Constitution, as originally written, did not define specifically who could or could not vote—but it did establish how the new country would vote.

Article 1 of the Constitution determined that members of the Senate and House of Representatives would both be elected directly by popular vote. The president, however, would be elected not by direct vote, but rather by the Electoral College. The Electoral College assigns a number of representative votes per state, typically based on the state's population. This indirect election method was seen as a balance between the popular vote and using a state's representatives in Congress to elect a president. Your vote may not directly elect the president, but if your vote joins enough others in your voting district or county, your vote undoubtedly matters when it comes to electoral results. Most states have a "winner take all" system where the popular vote winner gets the state's electoral votes. There are also local and state elections to consider. While presidential or other national elections usually get a significant voter turnout, local elections are typically decided by a much smaller group of voters.

It was not until the 15th Amendment was passed in 1869 that black men were allowed to vote. But even so, many would-be voters faced artificial hurdles like poll taxes, literacy tests, and other measures meant to discourage them from exercising their voting right. This would continue until the 24th Amendment in 1964, which eliminated the poll tax, and the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which ended Jim Crow laws. Women were denied the right to vote until 1920, when the long efforts of the women's suffrage movement resulted in the 19th Amendment.

With these amendments removing the previous barriers to voting (particularly sex and race), theoretically all American citizens over the age of 21 could vote by the mid 1960s. Later, in 1971, the American voting age was lowered to 18, building on the idea that if a person was old enough to serve their country in the military, they should be allowed to vote.

Across generations and over many elections, the bottom line remains the same: we believe that voting is a piece of our democracy, a right, a responsibility, a communal voice in what our future holds. Participating in elections is one of the key freedoms of American life. Many people in countries around the world do not have the same freedom, nor did many Americans in centuries past. No matter what you believe or whom you support, it is important to exercise your rights.

RECIPE CORNER

November 6 is National Nachos Day



National Nacho Day is celebrated on November 6th every year. It's a day to celebrate the cheesy, gooey dish that's enjoyed by many people. Nachos themselves have a fascinating history, with their creation often attributed to Ignacio "Nacho" Anaya, a Mexican chef who invented the dish in the 1940s.

Try making a nacho dish at home and share them with friends and family

Tortilla chips- skip the flavored ones (Doritos don't make great nachos). Thicker tortilla chips stand up to the toppings, skip thin cantina-style chips. Cheese — The best nacho recipe is one with lots of cheese; a blend of cheddar and Monterey jack cheese. To make it fast, use pre-shredded cheeses like Mexican or TexMex blends.

<u>Meat</u> – Seasoned ground beef & black beans.Swap out the beef use any leftover meats like barbacoa or steak!

Prepare meat mixture (if using): Brown ground beef, stir in taco seasoning, water, and black beans. Simmer until the water has evaporated.

Layer on a sheet pan: Layer chips with cheese, beef and bean mixture, and green onions.

Bake at 375 until the cheese is melted and bubbly. Remove from oven and load 'em up!

Add these BEFORE baking: Sliced black olives, red onions, canned or grilled corn, fresh jalapenos.

Add these AFTER baking: pickled jalapenos, diced tomatoes, green onions, diced avocado, cilantro.

Add these ON THE SIDE: guacamole, pico de Gallo, salsa, sour cream, lime wedges.

Early in-person voting: You can vote early and in person at your <u>local registrar's office or nearby satellite location</u> from Friday, Sept. 20, through Saturday, Nov. 2.

Voting at the polls: Polls are open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. You'll need to show an acceptable form of identification, such as a Virginia driver's license, or sign an ID confirmation statement to vote at the polls.

Why does October have two birthstones.....?

Because the National Association of Jewelers (NAJ) added tourmaline to the list in 1952 to address concerns about opal's durability and perceived femininity.



Opal, the traditional October birthstone, is believed to have originated in India (the source of the first opals brought to the Western world), where in Sanskrit it was called upala, a "precious stone." ." In ancient Rome, this became opalus. Most opals are valued for their shifting colors in rainbow hues — a phenomenon known as "play-of-color."

Tourmaline is the newer October birthstone. The name comes from the Sinhalese word toramalli, which means "stone with mixed colors," because it often has multiple colors in one crystal. Very few gems match tourmaline's dazzling array of colors. Perhaps this is why ancient mystics believed this October birthstone could inspire artistic expression – it has a color palette for every mood.
