

Preparation of the Town's budget for next fiscal year will begin soon. Citizens who have suggestions about what items should be given priority for funding during fiscal year 1990-91 are encouraged to express their views in writing to the Town Manager.

Comments should be submitted by Friday, February 9, addressed to John H. Schoeberlein, Town Manager, Vienna Town Hall, 127 Center St., S., Vienna, VA 22180.

February 9 is also the deadline for non-profit organizations to apply for donations of Town funds in FY 90-91. Requests must include the following information:

- Name of the organization and names and addresses of its principal officers;
- Purpose of the organization and a description of its programs and activities;
- Percentage of members or participants who live in town or who own or are employed by town businesses.
- Organization budget showing all income and expenses for the year in which the donation will be used.
- Amount of funding requested from the Town.
- Purpose for which the donation will be used.
- Synopsis of the fund-raising activities being conducted during the current year.

Household Waste Sites Open Soon

The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors has authorized a year-round Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Program to be run by the County Fire and Rescue Department.

Beginning in early 1990, the program will open two disposal facilities to the public - one at the Fire and Rescue Academy on West Ox Road in Fairfax and another adjacent to Fire Station 9 at the Mount Vernon Governmental Center. Both will maintain Saturday hours for citizen convenience. After implementation, an evaluation will be conducted to explore ways in which to improve or expand the program. The estimated cost of the program is \$480,533 for fiscal year 1990 and \$633,990 for FY 91.

The program will increase significantly the opportunity for safe and convenient disposal of household hazardous waste such as oil-based paints, pesticides, herbicides, household cleaners and lawn chemicals (excluding "Weed-begone" and dioxins).

Council Taps Olson To Fill Vacancy

Former Town Councilman Vincent J. Olson has been selected to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Councilman Richard L. Fisher, who was elected to the Virginia House of Delegates in November.

Olson, a Vienna resident for over 30 years and a Town Councilman from 1976 until he retired from Council in 1988, was appointed to serve until voters choose someone in the May Town election to serve out the remaining year of Fisher's two-year term.

Fisher will take office this month as 35th District Delegate to the Virginia General Assembly. He had been a Town Councilman since 1985.

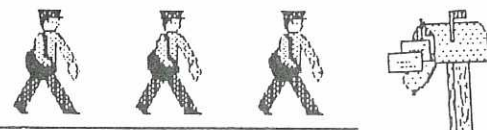
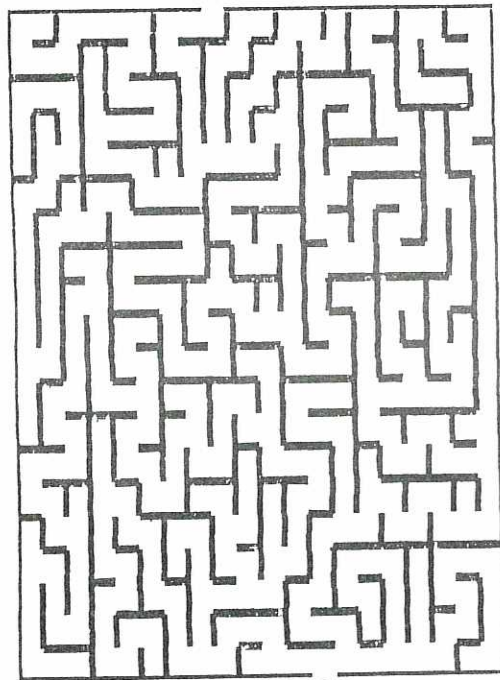
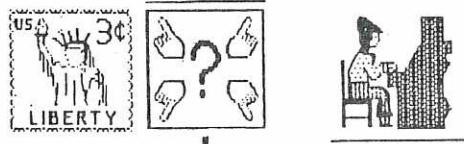

THE VIENNA POST OFFICE

Our town was first called Ayr Hill. In 1862, the POST OFFICE was named Vienna. Our first postmaster, Margaret Williams, kept the town mail in a bureau drawer. The Post Office has been in many other places: Bowman's Store, Freeman Store, 132 Church St. (now Vienna Office Supply). Today, the Vienna Post Office is in a modern building, with over 1500 post office boxes, and serving more than 5500 addresses in town. We have come a long way from one bureau drawer of mail. What do you think the post office will be like in our bicentennial year--2090?

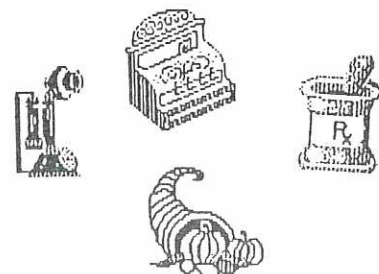

No. Va. Delegation To Hold Hearing

Members and members-elect of the Virginia General Assembly representing Fairfax County, Fairfax City and Falls Church have scheduled a public hearing for Saturday, January 6, to receive citizen recommendations regarding legislation to be considered at the 1990 General Assembly session.

The hearing will be held in the Board room on the "A" level of the Massey Building, 4100 Chain Bridge Rd. in Fairfax, and will begin at 9:15 a.m. and conclude no later than 12:30 p.m. Persons who wish to attend should enter the Massey Building at the lower level entrance on the south side. The upper level entrance near the flag poles is locked after normal office hours for building security.

Citizens who wish to speak at the public hearing may arrange to be placed on the speakers list by calling the Clerk to the Board at 246-3151 prior to January 5. Persons who are not on the speakers list will be given an opportunity to present testimony in the order of their arrival after the speakers list has been called. Since many speakers are expected, all speakers are requested to limit their presentation to no more than five minutes.

The hearing will be cablecast on Channel 16.

Time to Be Counted in Census

Every household in Fairfax County will be mailed a copy of the 1990 U.S. census survey in mid-March. The Census Bureau has designated April 1 as Census Day and asks that all surveys be returned by that date. Answers are kept confidential.

The census is important to Fairfax County citizens because it is used to determine how many Federal and State dollars will be returned to the County over the next 10 years for a variety of programs from housing to education. In fiscal year 1989, the County received grants totaling nearly \$300 per person based on data collected in the 1980 census. The 1990 population count will also be used to determine how many seats Virginia will have in the U.S. House of Representatives and will be used by the Commonwealth of Virginia to allocate seats in the General Assembly.

Winter Weed Walk

Learn to identify and appreciate "winter weeds," the dried parts of flowers from last summer and fall, on a walk along the Washington and Old Dominion Railroad Regional Trail beginning at the Reston Station on Saturday, January 27, at 2 p.m.

Walkers should be at least eight years old and dress warmly. The program is free, but reservations are required. To register and for more information, call the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority at 528-5406.

To reach the Reston Station from Vienna, take the W&OD Trail, or take Route 7 west, turn left on Baron Cameron Avenue, left on Reston Avenue, left on Sunset Hills Road, and left again on Old Reston Avenue.

The Census Bureau will be hiring temporary workers to help with the 1990 census. Most of the 5,000 positions to be filled in Northern Virginia will be for door-to-door canvassers and will be available in February or March. The salary is expected to be \$6 to \$7 per hour. New Federal legislation will allow Federal, postal and military retirees to accept a temporary census job for up to six months without any loss of retirement pay or benefits.

January Is Centennial Business History Month

The Vienna Centennial History Committee is kicking off the Centennial year by recognizing the history of the town's business community. A special exhibit of old business machines and a selection of old Vienna fire insurance logs will be displayed at Patrick Henry Library on Friday, January 12, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Saturday, January 13, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Sunday, January 14, from noon to 8 p.m. The exhibit of old typewriters, adding machines and printers, provided by North American Business Products, will be supervised by members of the Vienna chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons. The insurance logs were provided by Freeman & Sherburne Insurance Co.

In addition, artifacts, old photos and advertisements from early Vienna businesses will be displayed at the library, Town Hall and the Vienna Community Center throughout January. These include an early 1900's manual telephone switchboard, provided by C&P Telephone Co., in the lobby at Town Hall.

Farming was the principal business and way of life in early Vienna. Thompson Bros. Dairy was

begun in the 1920's by the five brothers' father, Joel F. Thompson. Milk from their 100 cows was pasteurized, bottled and delivered by truck to Vienna homes.

The businesses of Vienna originally developed and grew along Church Street. Many businesses were operated out of homes, such as Freeman's General Store (1859), Savia's barbershop, Gorham's wheelwright shop and Money Funeral Home (1881).

The Freeman Store was a center for news as well as groceries, hats and fabric. It was also a polling place in 1861, a post office and a fire station. The candy counter was always a special attraction.

Bouton's Store (now Pennywise Shop) had a variety of uses also. A newspaper office (1895), church meetings, post office in 1912 as well as a general merchandise store thrived there.

Bud Wright bought the Craig & Wright General Store (now Once Upon a Time) in 1935. Potatoes, corn, bread, wearables for ladies and gentlemen, and items for the home were sold. In 1944 William Hunt joined Wright to form the Wright & Hunt Department Store with the slogan "Wright here and Hunt no further." The main asset was its specialized customer service.

Savia's barbershop is still a family-run business. It began in the 1920's in the front room of the Savia home (now North American Office Products). The shop stayed open each day as long as there were customers.

Koehnlein's Bakery next door on the corner of Church and Center Streets baked bread and donuts, and especially remembered were the little almond meringue cookies. Wonderful smells filled the mornings when the screen door opened.

In 1903 the telephone company began in Howard Money's side porch on Church Street (where the house still stands). The manual switchboard moved down the street to Helena Gorham's house in 1916. The telephone operator that worked all night slept on a cot until someone cranked his phone to wake her for a call to be placed.

The ice cream parlor (now the Vienna Inn) was owned by the Freizers and was a local meeting place. It had four ice cream tables and matching chairs. You could also enjoy sandwiches, fountain Cokes, coffee and later a daily hot-plate special.

In 1923 the Piggly Wiggly grocery opened for four years across from the Freeman Store. In 1928 there was no self service at the Sanitary Grocery Store on Dominion Road; a clerk would bring each item you requested and meat was cut before your eyes. When the Sanitary moved to Maple Avenue, gambling was legal and slot machines were in the store!

Gladys Waggoner Barney owned a coal, block ice and wood yard at the end of Ayr Hill Avenue. These products came in on the train and then were delivered to each house by wagon or truck.

Centennial Coins Available Now

Vienna Centennial commemorative coins are now available to mark the 100th anniversary of Vienna's incorporation as a town. These coins are anodized aluminum in five colors - gold, copper, red, aluminum and blue - and bear the Centennial seal. The gold and copper coins have been minted in limited quantities and will be presented to visiting dignitaries and special guests during the 1990 celebration. The red, aluminum and blue coins will be circulated throughout the year.

The Vienna Centennial Committee is offering a limited number of the uncirculated coins for sale as a unique memento of this historic occasion. Coins are available individually or in sets. A maximum of 600 gold coins and 1,200 copper coins will be sold.

Moorefield Project

Anyone who has photos, documents or other memorabilia pertaining to Vienna's historic Moorefield house is asked to contact Historic Vienna, Inc.'s Moorefield restoration chairman, Kathy Battaglia, at Green Hedges School, 415 Windover Ave., N.W., phone 938-8323.

Moorefield, built around 1790, was the home of Jeremiah Moore, a Baptist minister who was an advocate for separation of church and state in this nation's early days. The house is now owned by the Town of Vienna. Restoration of Moorefield is a project of Historic Vienna, a non-profit organization for historic restoration and preservation.

Noise Ordinance

The Town/Business Liaison Committee will discuss a proposed noise ordinance at its January 11 meeting. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. All interested residents and members of the Vienna business community are encouraged to attend.

The ordinance would affect both residential and commercial zones. It would prohibit excessive noise during late evening and early morning hours from televisions, stereos, musical instruments and similar sources; construction equipment; motor vehicle repair; powered model vehicles; trash collection; loading and unloading or idling of delivery vehicles within 300 feet of residential property.

The ordinance lists "maximum sound pressure levels" for residential, commercial and industrial zones. Noise that exceeds these levels during restricted hours would be in violation of the ordinance and those responsible for the noise subject to a fine.

The proposed ordinance may be reviewed in the Planning and Zoning Department at Town Hall.
