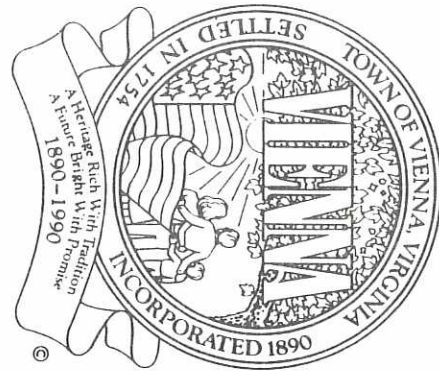

Glass Recycling Saves Resources and Money

The Town of Vienna's new glass recycling center is now open at the end of the parking lot on the Park Street side of the Vienna Community Center. Citizens are encouraged to help preserve our environment and reduce costly landfill fees by recycling glass food and beverage containers.

The recycling center is a modified 18-cubic yard dumpster, enclosed and divided into compartments for clear, green and brown colored glass. Before bringing glass to be recycled, rinse out any food residue and remove caps or lids. It is not necessary to remove labels or metal cap rings.

Only glass food and beverage containers are acceptable for recycling. Other forms of glass are not recyclable, including drinking glasses, heat-resistant ovenware, window glass, light bulbs, crystal, mirrors, and ceramic or pottery items.

Don't Forget! The Town also collects aluminum beverage containers and frozen dinner trays at the aluminum recycling center lo-

cated on the Mobil station property near McDonald's on West Maple Avenue. Waste motor oil is collected quarterly at the Town property yard on Nutley Street (next collection date June 2). West Side Exxon, John's Chevron and Vienna Mobil accept used motor oil.

A diligent recycler in southeast Vienna would like other residents to know about Metro Recyclers, 2801 Dorr Ave. in Merrifield, which accepts plastic and cardboard.

Fairfax County sponsors a hazardous waste disposal program (call 246-2937 or 246-2852 for info) and an auto battery recycling program (246-5052).

May Is Centennial Service Organization Month

Sixty Vienna area service organizations will mark the Town's Centennial with a "chautauqua" of entertainment and information May 11-13 at the Vienna Community Center. Band concerts, skits, lectures, and choral, dance, operatic and dramatic performances will be presented on stage, and booths throughout the Community Center will display the accomplishments of Vienna's own "thousand points of light," our many community volunteers.

The Centennial Chautauqua is modeled on a movement toward enlightenment and entertainment established in 1874 on the shores of Chautauqua Lake, N.Y.

Friday, May 11, 7-10:15 p.m.

"The Kids on the Block" (educational puppets), Vienna Community Band and Merry Makers Rhythm Band will perform. Organizations serving Vienna 50 years and more, and also those serving less than half a century, will be recognized. State Delegate Dick Fisher will be special guest speaker.

Saturday, May 12

10 a.m.-5:30 p.m. - Fifty organizations representing the grass roots of the Vienna community will have displays throughout the Community Center. Plants from local gardens will be for sale. Music, skits, demonstrations, slide-talks and magic shows will be presented on stage. Meet Fairfax County's new Sheriff Carl Peed.

7-10 p.m. - The Vienna Choral Society, Vienna Theatre Company and Vienna Light Opera Company will perform on stage.

Sunday, May 13

9 a.m.-2 p.m. - A Mother's Day pancake breakfast, prepared by the Vienna Lion's Club, will be available.

12 noon-6 p.m. - Stage performances will include the Thorau School Band, Touch of Gold

Quartet, Ayr Hill Players, Kilmer School Band, 28th Massachusetts Fife and Drum Corp, Vienna Stars Square Dancers, Vienna Community Band and George Chelena Chorale. Display booths will again be open.

Throughout the month of May, historical exhibits assembled by various community service organizations will be displayed at Town Hall, the Community Center and Patrick Henry Library. In addition, a directory of organizations has been prepared and will be distributed to participating organizations, Town Hall offices, the library and Welcome Wagon.

The Vienna area boasts four volunteer organizations that have provided service for over 50 years:

The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department (VVFD) first answered the call in 1903 with a handful of men and a hand-drawn fire engine. VVFD endures as Vienna's oldest volunteer organization. The VVFD Ladies' Auxiliary was organized in 1929.

The Fairfax County Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) was organized in 1905. Through the years, the County chapter has presented Citizenship medals to elementary school students and marked numerous historical sites, most recently Vienna's Moorefield house.

The American Red Cross, with 200 members from the Vienna area, has been functioning since 1918.

Ayr Hill Garden Club, founded in 1929, immediately launched its continuing landscaping, beautification and education pro-

grams. Beautification of the grounds of Vienna businesses and public buildings, and involvement in a host of community projects continues today.

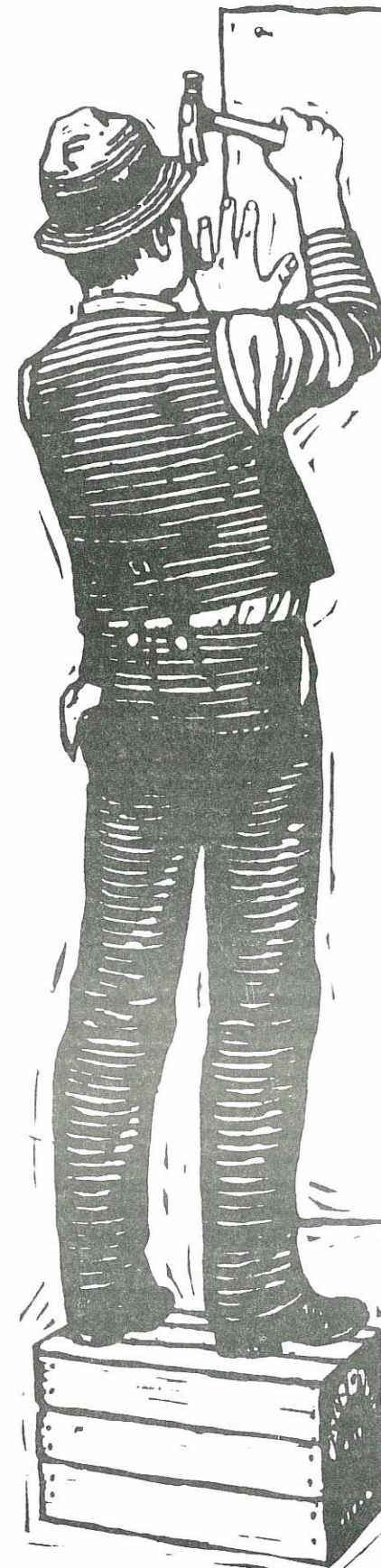

* Judging of Centennial beard and mustache contest.

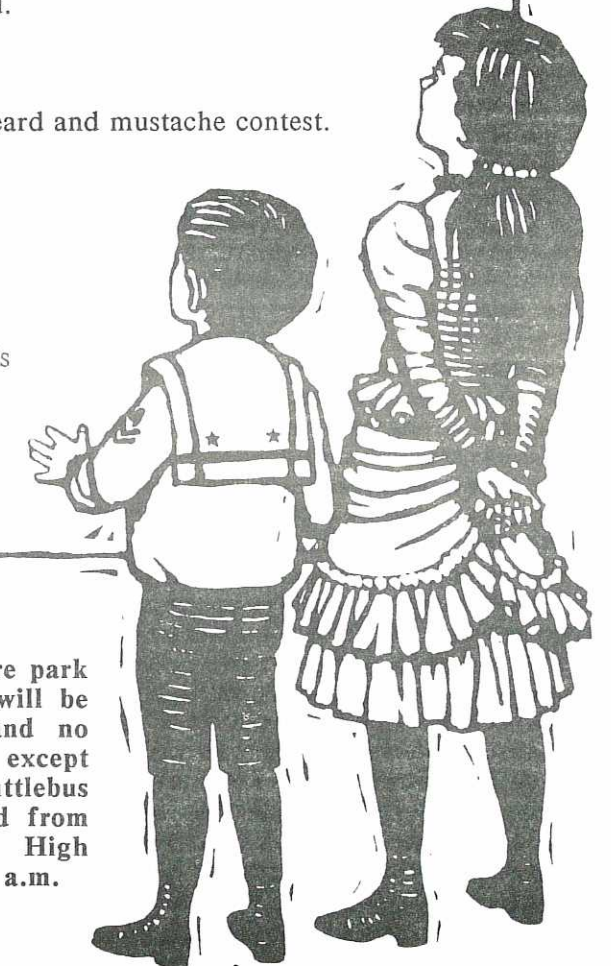
* Crab cake cookoff.

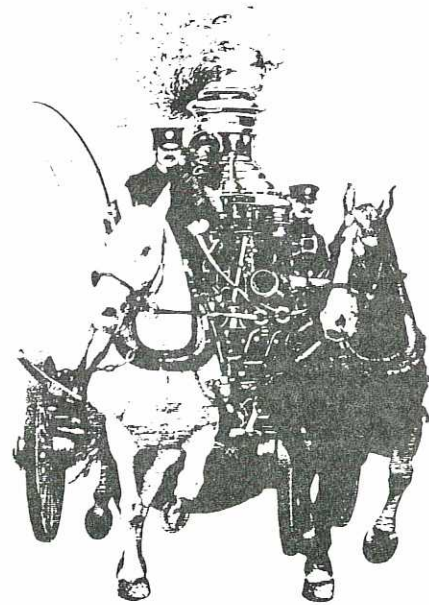


Fireman's Centennial Parade May 26

Modern and antique fire and rescue equipment will be the featured entries in the Vienna Centennial Fireman's Parade, which will step off at 10 a.m. Saturday, May 26. The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department is the sponsor of the parade and will host other fire departments from Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania.

The Grand Marshal of the parade will be Sam Savia, a past president of the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department who joined the organization as a teenager.

The parade will also include both the Navy and Marine Corps bands, antique cars, horses, clowns, the Hogettes, Blue Knights motorcycles, Smokey the Bear, McGruff the Crime Prevention Dog, and many other entries.



The route for the Fireman's Parade will be the same as the annual Halloween Parade. It will begin at Maple Avenue and Branch Road, follow Maple to Courthouse Road, turn left on Courthouse to Locust Street and left again on Locust to Waters Field, where the parade will disband.

Garage Sale Season Approaching

With the summer months approaching, the Town would like to remind residents of the regulations for holding garage sales.

- Each residence and/or family household may conduct no more than two sales each year.

- Each sale must be conducted during daylight hours for no more than two consecutive weekends.

- Two signs of not more than four square feet each are permitted on the property where the sale is being held.

- Two directional signs of not more than two square feet each are permitted, provided that the property on which the sale is held is not on a major thoroughfare and permission to erect the signs is received from the owners of the property where the signs are to be placed.

- No sign may be put up more than two days prior to the day of the sale.

- Signs must be removed each day at the close of the sale.

- Signs are not allowed to be posted in the Town right-of-way or on utility poles.

Church St. Plan

Conceptual plans for the Church Street Revitalization Project will be available for public review and comment on Tuesday, May 15, at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. Church Street merchants and property owners and all other interested citizens are invited to this presentation by the Town's planning staff.

The Church Street Revitalization Project, financed by Fairfax County bond funds, includes that section of Church Street between Lawyers Road and Park Street.
