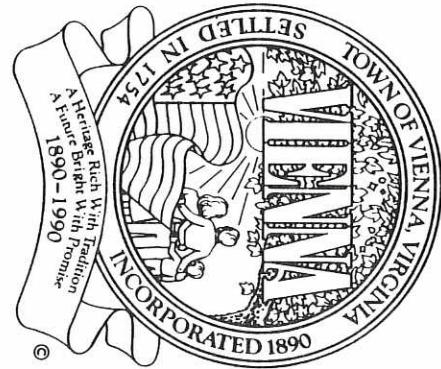

Viva! Vienna! Festival Will Feature Saturday Military Parade

ViVa! Vienna! '91 will be a two-day celebration in honor of U.S. armed forces who served in the Persian Gulf War.

The 8th annual town festival, held on Sunday of the Memorial Day weekend, will get a head start this year on Saturday, May 25, with a military parade, an opening ceremony, and evening entertainment.

The parade, featuring a variety of bands and military marching units, will begin at 4 p.m. at the corner of Maple Avenue and Branch Road. Parade spectators are invited to bring U.S. flags and join in at the end

of the parade as it proceeds along Maple Avenue and then turns up Center Street to Church Street, site of the ViVa! Vienna! festival. Opening ceremonies will then be held on the main stage in the Galliher parking lot next to the caboose.

The ViVa! Vienna! Committee wants to recognize all Vienna area residents who served in the Persian Gulf War. These men and women will be guests of honor at the ViVa! Vienna! May 13 Budget Public Hearing

A public hearing on the proposed Town of Vienna budget for fiscal year 1991-92 will be held at the May 13 Town Council meeting. The meeting begins at 8 p.m. at Town Hall, 127 Center St., S.

At the hearing, citizens will have the opportunity to comment and ask questions about the budget and the appropriation of Town funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The proposed general fund budget of \$9,256,103 is based on a real estate tax rate of 30 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation, an increase of two cents over the current rate. The proposed water and sewer fund budget is \$3,123,826.

Copies of the proposed budget are available at Town Hall.

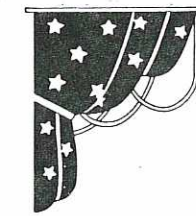

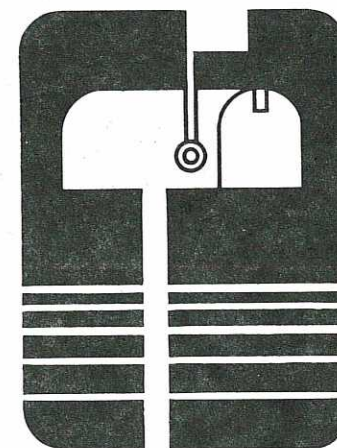
Police Dispatchers Honored by Mayor

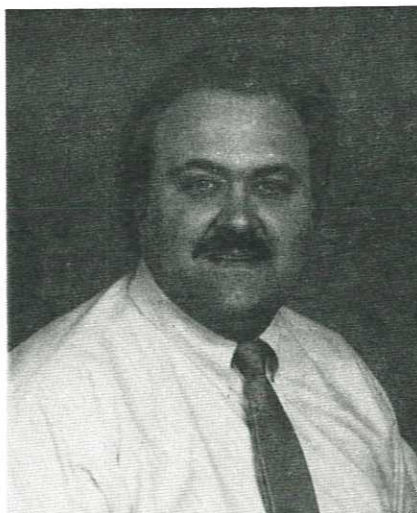
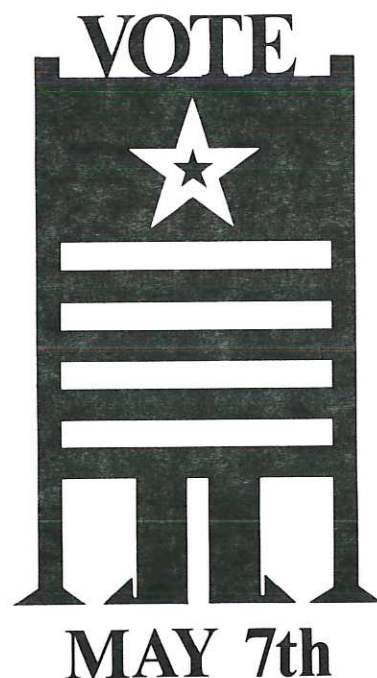
Meet The Candidates

Town of Vienna elections are held the first Tuesday in May each year for three Town Council seats, with the office of Mayor appearing on the ballot in even-numbered years. Town elections are non-partisan, and all Council members are elected at large. All registered voters in the Town of Vienna are eligible to vote in Town elections.

This year, five candidates are vying for three Town Council seats. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will begin two-year terms on July 1.

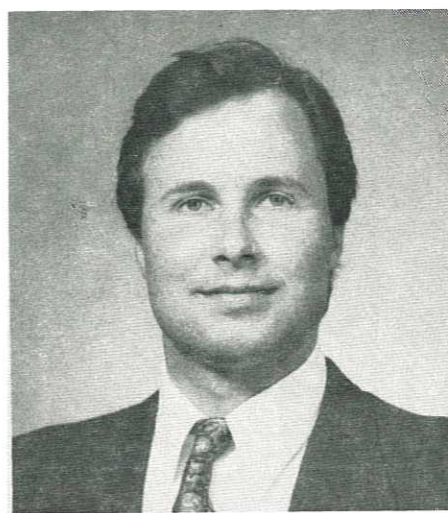
SALVATORE D. "SAL" ALONGE, 39, is owner and president of Alonge Enterprises, a mechanical and general contracting company. He has lived in Vienna for 14 years at 119 Locust St., S.W. He and his wife Laura have three sons.

"I know what it takes to be successful - HARD WORK and COMMITMENT. I respectfully ask for your vote, so that I can go to work for you."

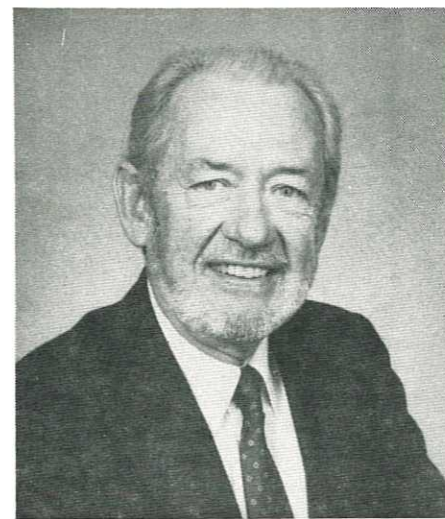

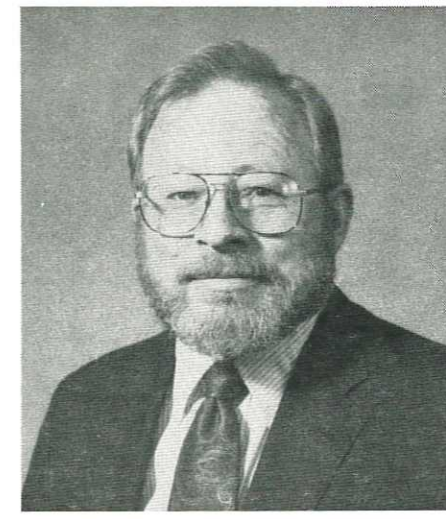

There is a need for upgrading our commercial areas, and I believe the Council should work with the business community to accomplish this, but no expansion of the current zones. What we have has worked well for Vienna in seeking to maintain the small-town atmosphere of which we are all so proud.
