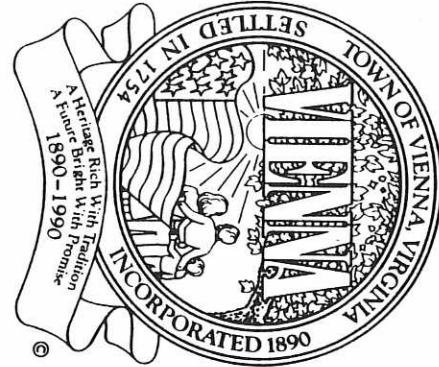

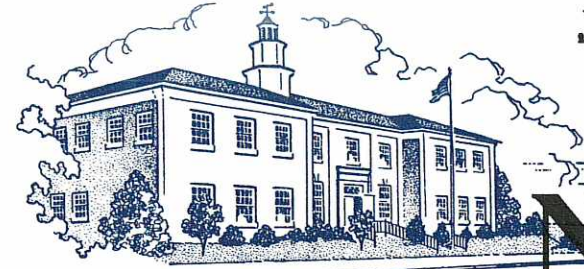

Council Adopts FY 93 Budget

The Town Council has adopted a budget for fiscal year 1992-93 totaling \$13,718,901. Copies of the budget are available in the Human Resources Office at Town Hall.

The budget is based on a real estate tax rate of 30¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation. Due to a decline in total assessed valuation of property in town, this rate translates into an effective tax rate *reduction* of 1.8%.

The total water and sewer rates (\$4.27 per 1,000 gallons for town residents and \$4.65 for out-of-town customers) will not change this fiscal year.

The budget was prepared based on existing economic conditions. Declines in the revenues received from the Commonwealth for street maintenance and police continue, and many local revenue sources are at a standstill. Town programs will be continued at their current levels with no change in the number of employees or compensation. One trash truck will be replaced this year; other capital purchases will be made only to avoid any decline in services.

The Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority can supply speakers and slide shows free of charge to community organizations. Don't Let Your Pet Suffer This July 4th

The busiest day of the year at the Fairfax County Animal Shelter is July 5, the day following the celebration of Independence Day. Phone lines are flooded with reports of lost and injured pets.

Noisy crowds at picnics and parades, the "thunder and lightning" of fireworks displays, and the sound of firecrackers exploding can be terrifying to even the most placid pet. Seeking relief from such noise and confusion, pets have been known to chew through ropes, leap six-foot fences, bolt through locked wooden doors, dive through second-story windows, and crash through sliding glass doors. In their frenzy, pets easily become disoriented and lost. Roaming pets are often injured by traffic or at the hands of cruel pranksters.

To ensure that pets have a safe and peaceful Independence Day, the Animal Shelter recommends leaving pets inside, with all windows and curtains closed and the air conditioner on at a normal level. This will muffle the frightening sounds outside. Those pets not ordinarily allowed inside the house should be sheltered in the basement or garage, with plenty of fresh water. Any pet that is the least bit frightened by the sounds of backfiring vehicles or thunder and lightening should not be left home alone. If a pet is particularly nervous, speak to a veterinarian about tranquilizing the animal during the holiday.

Also, animals can sometimes be desensitized to noises that trouble

Noisy Dogs Prohibited

The Town Code prohibits noisy dogs, which have "by loud, frequent and habitual barking, howling or crying, or other noises, caused annoyance or disturbed the peace or quiet of any person or persons in the neighborhood." This can be a serious problem, and the owner of a noisy dog may be summoned before the District Court and if found guilty required to remove the dog from the town limits.

them. Tape recordings of noises from July 4th festivities can be used to desensitize a pet gradually to the real thing, according to Animal Shelter staff. The recording should be introduced at a fairly high volume to determine a pet's reaction. If the recording provokes the same fear response as the original sound, the tape can be used for treatment. During treatment sessions, offer a pet small rewards to make it feel more comfortable. Continue the sessions daily, playing the recording at short intervals during a pleasant activity such as dinner or playtime. This should help to calm a pet's fear of loud noises.

Finally, make sure all pets wear identification. All cats should wear safety collars and an ID tag; all dogs in Vienna are required to have a Town dog license attached to a collar. Identification of a pet by a tag or tattoo is the only way to assist in locating its home.

Town Employees Earn Two Awards for Safety

The Town of Vienna has received the Virginia Safety Association's Winners Circle Award for "outstanding safety performance" during the 1991 calendar year. Vienna was honored for having lost only 224 work hours due to job-related injuries out of almost 345,000 hours worked last year. This was the best safety record of all Virginia jurisdictions that worked under a million hours. The awards are presented to recognize the advancement of safety within the Commonwealth in both the public and private sectors.

The Town has also been selected as a recipient of the Safety Performance Award for fiscal year 1991 by the Virginia Municipal Group Self Insurance Association. This award recognizes members of the program that have made a significant contribution by reducing and controlling losses.
