New W&OD Trail Light

The light installed on Maple Avenue at the W&OD Trail is now operational, allowing pedestrians and bicyclists to cross the street safely without having to leave the trail. The Town Council felt a responsibility to improve safety at this intersection, where trail users and Maple Avenue motorists encounter each other daily.

According to the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority, which owns the trail, such lights are a widely accepted method of providing a safe crossing, but they only work when trail users obey them. Some bikers and walkers have already been seen disregarding the new crossing signal. The Town urges all trail users to cross only when indicated and not endanger themselves or motorists.

Town Hall Renovations

The renovation of Town Hall to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act began last month. Asbestos removal and disposal was the first order of business and was scheduled to be completed by August 2. Air quality samples are being taken daily during the project, and all necessary precautions and safeguards have been implemented to ensure the safety of Town employees and visitors to Town Hall and to protect the environment.

The renovation is expected to be completed by the end of October and will include installation of an elevator, replacement of doors and frames to allow access by wheelchair, modifications to restrooms, and relocation of telephones and drinking fountains.

Town Water Unaffected By Bacteria in DC System

Recent news articles about the presence of bacteria in the District of Columbia's water supply may have caused some confusion among Vienna residents concerning the quality of their water. Although the Town receives water from the same source as D.C., the bad samples discovered were the result of the District not maintaining its own system.

When the water leaves the Dalecarlia Treatment Plant, it is chlorinated and, therefore, does not contain bacteria. The bacteria that were discovered recently came from sediment clinging to the interior of the pipes in the District's distribution system.

In Vienna, the Public Works Department tests for bacteria on a monthly basis and flushes the system once a year. This regular maintenance and testing program protects the public from unacceptable levels of bacteria.

In mid-July, the amount of chlorine in the water leaving the Dalecarlia Treatment Plant was increased temporarily to help strengthen the disinfection for the District's water system. Vienna water customers may have noticed a stronger than usual chlorine smell in their water during this period, but the increased level of chlorine did not exceed the range set by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Keep Plantings and Grass Trimmed

The Public Works Department and the Planning and Zoning Department remind residents to make sure that bushes and other plantings are trimmed so that they do not obstruct the vision of motorists or impede pedestrians and bicyclists on a sidewalk or right-of-way.

The Town Code restricts the height of plantings, fences and shrubbery to three feet above the curb level within 25 feet of an intersection. Keeping foliage trimmed makes it easier to see approaching vehicles. If you have questions or complaints about obstruction of vision at intersections, please call the Planning and Zoning Department at 255-6341.

The Town Code also prohibits vegetation from encroaching on any sidewalk or right-of-way. If you have questions or complaints about obstruction of sidewalks or rights-of-way, please call the Public Works Department at 255-6382.

Although not required by the Town Code, citizens are asked to help control grass and weeds growing up through cracks in the sidewalk and between the sidewalk and street. This unwanted growth detracts from Vienna's beauty and can lead to costly concrete and asphalt repairs. The Town government recognizes the problem of upkeep in rights-of-way, but it simply does not have the personnel required to maintain these areas as it would like and must rely on citizens to help in controlling grass and weeds around their property.

Park Street, with Lewis, Scully, Gionet, Inc., as outlined in a previously awarded contract, in an amount not to exceed \$65,000.

- Approved the agreement between the Town of Vienna and the Virginia Department of Transportation for the Cottage Street reconstruction project from Moore Avenue to Locust Street, including the connecting roadway between Locust and the Vienna Shopping Center.

- Amended the Vienna Bikeway Plan to conform with changes made in section numbering in the Code of Virginia.

- Adopted the Town budget and set tax rates for fiscal year 1996-97.

JUNE 17, 1996

- Continued a public hearing on a proposed ordinance for a franchise to install a wireless communication system within the town. Deferred awarding a franchise pending further investigation of the matter with Fairfax County and the Virginia Department of Transportation.

- Conducted a public hearing on an appeal by Taco Bell Corp. of a decision by the Board of Architectural Review.

- Conducted a public hearing on the

addition of the new C-1B, pedestrian commercial zone, and the PR, park and recreational zone, to the list of zoning categories.

- Approved the installation of a flashing light on eastbound Maple Avenue to warn motorists of the traffic signal at Follin Lane.

- Adopted a resolution in support of a grant application to improve the trail in Wildwood Park between Follin Lane and the W&OD Regional Trail.

- Authorized the planting of trees for screening adjacent to the Northside Property Yard. The trees will be planted on private property with the agreement of the property owners.

- Authorized the overlay of the existing asphalt sidewalk on Adahi Road between Glyndon Street and Aponi Road.

- Awarded a bid for Town Hall renovations to Falls Church Construction Co. in the amount of \$521,000.

- Awarded a contract for concrete repair to Arthur Construction Co. of Herndon in the amount of \$103,490.

- Awarded contracts for heavy equipment rental as follows: rubber tire loader to Hertz Equipment; mini excavator to Sunbelt, Inc.; track type loader, ten-wheel dump truck, tractor with demolition trailer, and truck mounted excavator to Prince William Construction, for a total amount of \$30,000.

- Reappointed Town Attorney John F. Gionfriddo, Town Clerk Carol A. Orndorff, Town Treasurer Philip R. Grant and Town Manager John H. Schoeberlein for fiscal year 1996-97.

The Right Way To Recycle Plastic

Plastics recycling is one of America's newest success stories. Last year, one-third of all the carpet manufactured in the U.S. contained recycled #1 plastic, which comes from used soda bottles. In this and other manufacturing areas, the demand for post-consumer plastics has soared. Yet, there is a great deal of consumer confusion over what types of plastic are acceptable in a municipal recycling program like Vienna's.

While most residents know that only #1 and #2 plastics can be recycled, they may not realize the further restriction of *bottles and jugs only*. While margarine tubs, yogurt cups and frozen food trays may be marked with a #1 or #2, they have undergone a different manufacturing process and possess different physical properties from #1 and #2 bottles and jugs. These differences cause plastics other than #1 and #2 bottles and jugs to act as contaminants that must be sorted out and removed at the recycling facility.

The most common plastic recyclables are soda bottles, and milk, juice, bleach and detergent jugs. A good way to determine whether plastic containers are recyclable is to "check for the neck." If the container neck is smaller than its base, recycle it; if not, throw it away with the household trash.

To prepare plastics for recycling, remove caps and lids (neck rings are OK); rinse the container to remove food or product residue; and crush if possible to save space. Do not try to cut out spouts or any other molded plastic.

Enjoy Vienna's Parks This Summer

Enjoy summer weather, recreation and the great outdoors at Vienna's hometown parks. Both Glyndon Park and Meadow Lane Park offer lighted tennis courts, basketball courts, ballfields, playground equipment, picnic areas and restrooms. The pavilion at each park may be reserved for group picnics. The fee for Town of Vienna groups is \$15 for a maximum of five hours.

Northside Park is undeveloped and has no facilities, but is a pleasant area for nature walks and family picnics. Southside Park has ballfields and playground equipment.

Commercial Vehicle Parking Rules

The Town Code prohibits the parking of commercial vehicles for more than one hour in any 24-hour period in all residential zones.

However, one commercial vehicle not exceeding 20,000 pounds gross weight may be parked overnight and on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays off the street and on the property of the vehicle's owner or custodian provided that, once parked, it is not moved or operated at any time for any profit-making business or professional enterprise. Between the hours of 7 p.m. and 5 a.m. no commercial vehicle shall be operated, nor its engine run for any purpose whatsoever, nor be driven from its parked location.

Notwithstanding the above provisions, any commercial vehicle may be parked on a residential street for more than one hour while actually being loaded or unloaded or while the custodian of the vehicle is actively performing services as long as the residence is not that of the custodian of the vehicle.

The Town needs the assistance of neighbors in order to enforce these regulations since every street cannot be patrolled around the clock. If you see a vehicle which appears to be in violation or if you have any questions regarding commercial vehicles, please call the Department of Planning and Zoning at 255-6341.

Avoid Health Problems by Heeding Color-coded Air Pollution Alerts

Are summer's sweltering days getting you down? It may be more than the heat; it may be the physical effects of ground-level ozone pollution. Daily ground-level ozone forecasts are issued through the local news media by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG). The forecasts, which are prepared by a team of meteorologists and technical staff from Virginia, Maryland and COG, rank air quality according to colors: Code Green = Good; Code Yellow = Moderate; Code Orange = Approaching Unhealthful; and Code Red = Unhealthful.

When a Code Red alert is issued, the following actions are recommended: Children and the elderly should reduce outdoor activities. Healthy individuals should limit strenuous outdoor work or exercise. Individuals with heart or respiratory ailments, emphysema, asthma, or chronic bronchitis should limit their outdoor activities and if breathing becomes difficult, move indoors.

In addition to the local news media, citizens may obtain the daily forecasts by calling the COG Air Quality Hotline at (202) 962-3299, or by accessing COG's Homepage at <http://www.cais.net/mwcoag/> on the World Wide Web.

Ground-level ozone can cause health problems such as lung damage, eye irritation, breathing difficulties, coughing and chest pain. On a typical summer day, about 60 to 70 percent of the pollutants that cause ozone are created by cars, lawnmowers and other gasoline-powered garden equipment, oil-based paints, and common household products.

During ozone alerts, individuals can help keep ozone levels to a minimum by these actions: drive less but if you must drive, combine errands; keep car tuned and tires properly inflated, refuel cars after dusk to limit daytime pollution releases, and limit engine idling as much as possible; take mass transit or carpool; avoid using aerosols and use environmentally safe paints and cleaning products; don't mow your lawn with a gas-powered mower; conserve electricity and set air conditioner thermostats at 78°.

Town Council Public Hearings

Following its summer recess, the Town Council will meet on Monday, August 19, at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. At that meeting, Council will conduct three public hearings.

The first hearing is on a proposal to increase rental fees at the Community Center for all groups conducting commercial or fundraising events. Fees charged to non-profit organizations for activities classified as non-fundraising would not change.

The second public hearing is for the adoption of the 1996 update to the official Town map. The map shows all existing and proposed public streets, alleys, walkways, park lands and other public properties.

The third hearing is to consider changes in Media General Cable's basic service rate and equipment charges. These fees are required to be updated annually to reflect actual costs and the FCC's current authorized rate of return.

Interested citizens are encouraged to attend public hearings and express their views. More information about these items is available for public review in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall.

Yard Sale Reminder

Each household in town may hold two garage/yard sales per year. Two advertising signs, no larger than four square feet each, may be displayed on the property where the sale takes place, and two directional signs, no larger than two square feet each, may be placed on other private property with the owner's permission. Signs are not permitted on public property, in the public right-of-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement), or on utility poles. Illegally placed signs will be removed.
