

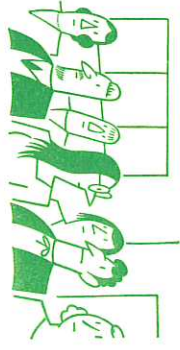

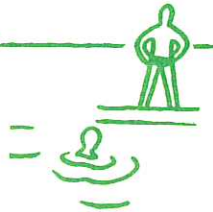
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MEN'S SOFTBALL

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SWIMMING POOLS

With warm weather on the way, Vienna residents are thinking about filling their pools. The Town has received requests regarding water and sewer cost adjustments for this project.

Swimming pools must be filled by using the garden hose. It is not possible to use fire hydrants or to make arrangements with the fire department.

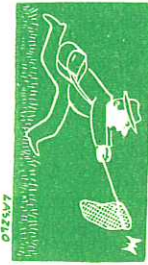
When you have filled your pool, notify the Finance Department at Town Hall. The amount of water going into the pool will be obtained by taking the difference in the consumption for the billing period in which the pool was filled and the prior period. You will be billed for the entire amount of water, but not for a sewer service fee on the water used for filling the pool.

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BOYS AND GIRLS STATEPROGRESS REPORT

The Town is again sponsoring one boy and one girl to the Boys and Girls State Program this year in conjunction with the American Legion Dyer-Gunnell Post 180.

This is a citizenship program by which our young people are instructed in the operation of government, in order that they may become more active and responsive citizens.

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SWIMMING POOL

The final plans for the pool at the Community Center are now being approved. However due to delays caused by needed land acquisition, it is estimated that the pool will not be completed before late fall. This is better than it sounds as the pool will be covered and suitable for year round use. It will be 25 meters or 1/2 Olympic size and the plans include a kiddie pool, patio and dressing rooms.

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IT'S SPRING FOR PETS TOO!

Dogs and cats which have been content to stay pretty close to home during the warm months, are feeling the call of spring. Martha Pennino, Supervisor of the Centerville District said, "the Dog Warden for Vienna has been active and assigned to the area since Feb. 25. Over 18 warning tickets, nine summons and five warrants have been issued in the Town." She urges people to keep their dogs under control and avail themselves of copies of the Dog Ordinance.

Fines have been increased for dogs running at large, noisy dogs or dogs who have not been innoculated. First offense is \$15, second \$25 and third \$50.

While complaints about dogs have decreased, Town Hall is still receiving complaints about cats who upset trash cans, ruin gardens and spoil children's sand boxes. Please be considerate and keep your pets confined.

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CARNIVAL

The Vienna Little League Carnival, a yearly event greatly anticipated by the youngsters, will be held for only one week this year, June 15 thru 20. Council, as usual, has waived any permit fees.

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COUNTY ASSISTANCE WITH STORM SEWER

Supervisor Martha Pennino delivered a check for \$8000 to Mayor Martinelli as a County contribution toward a storm sewer recently constructed by the Town in the vicinity of Cedar Lane Elementary School.

The storm sewer drains a part of Fairfax County as well as the Cedar Lane School District. Mrs. Pennino supported the Town's request for County assistance.

For their Earth Day project Madison students took over the cleaning up of Vienna's business area. Armed with plastic trash bags and assisted by Town trucks, classes competed with each other to see which could fill the greatest number of bags.

Other students planted shrubs in areas selected by the Beautification Advisory Committee.

After an afternoon of work, refreshments were served and a dance held on the grounds of the Community Center.

MADISON BAND

On May 27, the Madison Band will present a concert at Glynndon Park, under the direction of Paul Berryman. The program will begin at 7 p.m., public is invited and there is no charge. In case of rain the concert will be held in the high school auditorium.



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READING EFFICIENCY COURSE

The Community Center is sponsoring a reading efficiency course for adults which will include young people in the 10th grade or above. The course is designed to increase comprehension and reading rate and to make one a more flexible reader. One hour a day home practice will be required.

Techniques taught will be skimming, scanning, speed reading, study and critical reading. Course content consists of: Principles of the Reading Process, Principles of Comprehension, Learning Principles, Principles of Memory and Principles of Studay. Cost is \$50 for 20 hrs., the five week course from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday beginning May 5, the eight week course 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon Fridays beginning May 8.

WALK FOR MANKIND

Young people from all of the local high schools and intermediate schools will take part in Project Concern's "Walk for Mankind" to aid medical facilities in under-developed areas.

Each walker will seek sponsors who will pay him so much for mile walked along the 21-mile route in Vienna. As he walks, each walker will pick up litter. Walkers carry cards which are validated along check points, and after the walk he will take the card to his sponsors to receive his money.

Adult help is needed to man check points and to pick up walkers who drop out. The Jaycees are sponsoring the project. If you can help call 938-2803 or 938-6909.
