FEBRUARY 1997 – 1997 marks the 100th anniversary of Vienna’s original library, now located on the Freeman House property, and Historic Vienna, Inc., is planning activities for a year-long celebration. In 1897, Vienna citizens began one of the earliest libraries in Fairfax County, which originally stood on the corner of Maple Avenue and Library Lane. In 1913 it was moved to Maple and Center Street where it stood until Patrick Henry Library was built.

FEBRUARY 1987 – Local history buffs won’t want to miss Black History Month events at Patrick Henry Library, including a panel discussion entitled “Blacks in Vienna” with speakers Vondell Carter, Sylvia Taylor and Deloris Evans, and a concert by the Gospel Singers of the First Baptist Church of Vienna followed by the presentation to the library of an oil portrait of early Vienna library supporter William McKinley Carter.

FEBRUARY 1977 – In a petition to Federal Aviation Administrator John L. McLucas, Mayor Charles Robinson expressed support of the President’s Council on Wage and Price Stability request to have the Dulles Access Road open to non-airport traffic. The Mayor petitioned McLucas after the Town Council unanimously voted to intervene in the proceeding between the President’s Council and the FAA.

FEBRUARY 1967 – The campaign for the beautification and betterment of “My Kind of Town – Vienna” is beginning to gain momentum. Mayor Martinelli and “Egbert the Elf,” along with representatives of the Vienna Police Association, have begun visiting all of the elementary schools, emphasizing anti-litter and “What I can do to help.”

Sewer Backups Are Expensive! Backup Insurance Is Not!

The Town of Vienna makes every attempt to prevent sewer backups before they occur. Sewer lines are specially designed to prevent accumulation and stoppages. In addition, a maintenance crew is devoted to inspecting and cleaning sewer lines throughout the Town on a regular basis. Degreasing chemicals are also injected into lines in areas that are prone to stoppages, such as those near restaurants and apartments. Even with this rigorous maintenance schedule, however, backups can still occur.

All insurance companies writing homeowner policies in Virginia offer special coverage for damage resulting from backups of drains and sewers, and this additional protection is available at very reasonable rates. For information on obtaining sewer backup coverage, contact your insurance company. The Town’s insurance carrier rarely approves claims resulting from sewer backups unless negligence in maintaining the system can be shown. Therefore, residents are encouraged to protect their property by obtaining sewer backup insurance.

Tysons Land Use Task Force Outlines Activities for 2007

The Tysons Land Use Task Force has outlined its planning and public outreach activities for 2007, which center around alternative models of Tysons Corner and opportunities for input from residents, workers and landowners. Workshops will be held in March at which the public will be able to discuss the future of Tysons Corner.

Details of the yearlong planning process were scheduled to be finalized last month. The main planning and public outreach activities outlined by the task force include:

- **January-March:** Development of a base model, along with three alternative models based on the task force’s guiding planning principles.
- **March:** Workshops to explore the public’s ideas, suggestions and concepts for reshaping the alternative models.
- **April:** Refinement of the alternative models based on input from the public workshops.
- **April-June:** Evaluation of the refined alternative models to understand feasibility and ramifications.
- **June:** Presentation of the refined alternatives to the public for comment.
- **July-August:** Development of a preferred model using public comment and findings of the evaluation.
- **September:** Public comment on the preferred model.
- **September-November:** Refinement of the preferred model based on public comment.
- **December:** Final model presented to the task force.

An urban design planning consultant working for Fairfax County and the task force is following the task force’s eight guiding planning principles finalized last fall after receiving public input. The planning consultant has reviewed results of public input to date and talked with a variety of stakeholders during December and January to ensure a complete understanding of the issues and concerns.

The task force will use the final model and the results of the planning process to develop detailed recommendations for revising the 1994 Tysons Corner Comprehensive Plan. The task force’s recommendations will be presented first to the County Planning Commission for its consideration and then to the Board of Supervisors.

Business License Renewal Deadline

Town businesses are reminded that March 1 is the deadline for payment of the annual business, professional and occupational license (BPOL) tax. All businesses in the Town of Vienna, including home occupations, must renew their business licenses by March 1 each year.

The amount of the tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. The gross receipts threshold is \$50,000, below which the tax does not apply. Those businesses with total annual gross receipts of \$50,000 or less pay only the minimum license fee of \$30 per year.

Annual Financial Report Available

The Town of Vienna's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for fiscal year 2005-2006 is now available. Copies may be reviewed in the Finance Department at Town Hall or purchased for \$5 each.

The report summarizes the Town's financial position and the results of operations of the various funds and account groups. It also includes the auditor's report for FY 2006, information on internal controls for managing and safeguarding funds, and selected financial and demographic information covering the last 10 fiscal years.

County Staff Available for 2008 Budget Presentations

On Monday, February 26, Fairfax County Executive Anthony H. Griffin will present the County's fiscal year 2007-2008 advertised budget plan. In the weeks after the budget is released, staff from the Department of Management and Budget will be available to provide briefings for civic associations and other groups. These generally last one or two hours depending on the number of questions and the size of the group. Call 703-324-2391 if your group wishes to schedule a briefing. It is helpful if you can provide several alternative dates; the name, size and make-up of the group; and if there are any particular areas of interest, as well as any special accommodations required.

Public Hearings on the proposed FY 2008 budget plan, FY 2007 third quarter review, and FY 2008-2012 capital improvement program (with future years to 2017) will be held at the Government Center April 9-11, at 7 p.m. Adoption by the Board of Supervisors is scheduled for Monday, April 30. Filing Deadline for Town Election

Tuesday, March 6, is the filing deadline for candidates in the May 1 Town election. This year, voters will elect three Town Council members for two-year terms beginning July 1.

Candidates for office must meet certain qualifications and are required to file specific documents in order to qualify to appear on the ballot. Winter Storms Still Possible

Despite record mild temperatures, Vienna could still see a snow storm before the winter is over. Residents who are physically able are requested to shovel snow from sidewalks next to their property and to clear ice and snow from fire hydrants near their homes. In case of an emergency, firefighters will be able to respond much quicker if the hydrants are accessible.

Vienna area teens are available to shovel snow and help with other odd jobs. The teen and the person needing the work decide on the amount to be paid for the service. Teens can sign up at the Community Center, and residents can call 703-255-6360 to be matched with a young worker.

Town businesses that hire snowplows to clear their parking lots should make sure that snow is not piled onto adjoining sidewalks or pushed into the street. Also, it is illegal to block handicapped parking spaces with snow.

Last Chance to Order Mulch

February 28 is the last day to order a free delivery of ground leaf mulch or ground wood mulch from the Public Works Department. To place your order, call 703-255-6388 and leave your name, address, daytime phone number, type of mulch desired (wood or leaf) and the number of loads to be delivered. One load is estimated to be 2-2.5 cubic yards (about the size of a VW Beetle). Half loads are also available.

Please note the following important conditions:

• **All mulch deliveries are based on availability of mulch.**

• **Mulch deliveries will be placed only in the driveway at the end closest to the house.**

• **Once mulch is delivered, it becomes the property of the homeowner and the Town will not remove any excess mulch ordered.**

Residents may pick up mulch themselves in any amount between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday (except holidays) until March 30. The mulch is stored on Town-owned property off Beulah Road near Glyndon Park. Look for the sign, "Free Leaf Mulch & Wood Mulch."

By grinding leaves and brush into recyclable mulch, the Town saves thousands of dollars in landfill fees each year while providing residents with free mulch.

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries is Saturday, March 3, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill St., N.E. This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For more information, call 703-255-6381.

Too often, used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water, releasing toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic into the environment. Recycled oil is a valuable resource that can be re-manufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia it is illegal to dispose of automobile batteries with refuse.

Library Launches Self-Checkout

Readers can now check out their own books at the Fairfax County Public Library. The new service, similar to the self-checkout scanners at area supermarkets, is called Express Checkout and, according to Library Director Edwin S. Clay III, its main benefit will be that "it frees up staff to give better personalized service."

Each of the library's 21 branches, including Vienna's Patrick Henry Library, now has an Express Checkout scanner that reads the bar codes on the library books being checked out, along with the bar code on the reader's library card. For routine transactions, customers can just check out their own books and go. Library staff will continue to help customers check out DVDs, pay fines, pick up reserved items, etc.

In fiscal year 2006, which ended June 30, the library system checked out more than 11 million books and other items. Fairfax County has one of the busiest public library systems in the U.S., having recorded more than five million visits to its branches last year.

- charged at \$25.00 each. Residents or nonprofit organizations may call the Special Pickup Hotline at 703-255-5727 to arrange for a special pickup. The amounts and type of debris are limited to the following:
- Discarded furniture, swing sets and play-ground equipment.
 - Sod and brush.
 - 300 pounds of scrap metal per residence, small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires. All tires must be removed from the rim.
 - Trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½ inches and less than 6 inches, and no more than 8 feet in length.
 - Building materials (not generated by contractor), which shall include the following items: wood, broken concrete, bricks or block, fences, drywall, and paneling. Each residence shall be limited to 300 pounds (approximately two wheelbarrow loads) of masonry items such as concrete, brick, block, stone, rock, etc. per pickup.
 - Please refrain from placing piles of brush under power lines or trees, or close to shrubs, walls or vehicles. Place all piles in an open area accessible to a crane truck.
 - All sharp items such as box cutters, razors, saw blades and large panes of glass should be wrapped in several layers of newspaper.
 - In the interest of safety, parents should caution their children not to play in or around debris placed at the curb for a special pickup.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS

The Public Works Department will **not** pick up the following items:

- Gas tanks
- Fuel oil tanks
- Pressurized tanks such as propane, air or freon
- Mounted tires (Town crews will pick up the tire and the rim as long as they are separated.)
- Tree stumps and tree parts over 6 inches in diameter. Large tree stumps or tree parts over 6 inches can be disposed of at the Fairfax County

- Transfer Station located on West Ox Road or at the Fairfax County Landfill located in Lorton.
- Paint cans. Hazardous materials such as fuel tanks, paints, solvents, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes, etc. can be disposed of through the Fairfax County Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. The drop-off center for hazardous waste is the I-66 Citizens' Recycling and Disposal Facility located at 4618 West Ox Road (just beyond the Fire & Rescue training academy).  - Biohazardous waste including needles and syringes
 - Contractor generated material
 - Brush and trash that are mixed
 - Dirt

Monday and Thursday

All residences north of Maple Avenue.

Tuesday and Friday

All residences south of Maple Avenue and east of Cottage Street.

Wednesday and Thursday

All residences south of Maple Avenue, west of Cottage Street, and north of Tapawingo Road (including both sides of Tapawingo).

Wednesday and Friday

All residences south of Tapawingo Road (but not including Tapawingo), west of Cottage Street, and north of the Town line.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Collection for regular trash and yard waste (except bundled brush) will be made once weekly on the first collection day of the week.

Collection for mixed recyclable materials, newspapers and bundled brush will be made once weekly on the second collection day of the week.

Collection will not be scheduled for Sundays, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day. When a regular collection day is missed because of adverse weather conditions, a holiday, or mechanical difficulties, collections will be made on the next regularly scheduled day for that route.

REFUSE

Regular household trash, and yard waste consisting of grass, leaves, small clippings, acorns, walnuts, tree vegetation, etc., will be collected on the first day of the scheduled route. Yard waste must be bagged in **clear plastic or kraft paper** bags and separated from the regular trash (20 bag maximum and 40 lb. weight per bag maximum). Dirt will not be accepted with yard waste. Plastic trash bags may be purchased from the Finance Department at Town Hall every weekday from 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M.

All refuse shall be placed at the curbline or edge of pavement by 7:00 A.M. on collection day (but not earlier than 6:00 P.M. the preceding evening) where it will be easily and safely accessible. Refuse con-

tainers shall not be placed and left on a sidewalk or any portion of a street right-of-way where they would interfere with traffic. All trash cans shall be removed from the curbline or edge of pavement as soon as possible after trash pickup and by 7:00 P.M. the same evening as collection. The Town reserves the right to designate the collection point where there is a question or doubt.

All trash containers shall be a maximum size of 55 gallons with a 40 lb. weight limit, be watertight metal or plastic (non-breakable), with handles and tight-fitting covers. Larger size containers used with automated trash trucks are not acceptable due to the fact that Town trash trucks are not equipped for this type of operation. Plastic bags may be substituted for trash containers provided they meet the 40 lb. weight limit. The bags shall be removed from the can or other holder, tied at the top, and placed at the curbline or edge of pavement.

In the interest of health and safety, trash crews will only dispose of defective trash cans that are no longer suitable for use when the cans are upside down and clearly marked **TAKE** for disposal. Oversize automated tote-type cans are **not accepted** for means of trash disposal.

RECYCLABLES

Mixed recyclable materials, newspapers, flattened cardboard, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, telephone books, and bundled brush will be collected on the second day of the scheduled trash route. (See section on "Routes" above.) Recyclables shall be placed at the curb or edge of pavement by 7:00 A.M. on collection day (but not earlier than 6:00 P.M. the preceding evening) where they will be easily and safely accessible. Recyclables shall be prepared in the following manner:

MIXED MATERIALS: GLASS bottles and jars, all colors; #1 and #2 PLASTIC bottles and jugs; METAL food and beverage cans; and ALUMINUM foil and plates shall be placed together in a transparent plastic bag. All mixed materials must be thoroughly rinsed.

NEWSPAPERS, FLATTENED CARDBOARD, MAGAZINES, CATALOGS, JUNK MAIL, AND TELEPHONE BOOKS: Must be bun-

dled and tied with cord or placed in brown paper (not plastic) bags separate from other recyclables. No styrofoam packing, peanuts, or plastic wrapping should be left in any cardboard box.

BRUSH: Shall be cut in four-foot lengths and bundled or placed in trash cans, not to exceed 2 inches above the top of the can, with a 10 bundle or 10 can limit per pickup. The diameter for brush collected in bundles is limited to 1½ inches.

STYROFOAM: Styrofoam is not recyclable and should be disposed of with the regular trash.

SPECIAL PICKUPS

Each residence or nonprofit organization located in a residential zone is allowed two free special pickup loads each year beginning January 2 through October 1. All requests for special pickups must be called in to the Department of Public Works. No orders for special pickups will be taken during October, November and December due to leaf collection.

Special pickups are for the sole use of the property where the trash has been generated and cannot be transferred to another property in the town. All items shall be placed at the curb or edge of pavement in front of your property. Discards shall not be placed so that they block the sidewalk or street. Discards shall not be placed around trees, poles, signs, fire hydrants, fences, or other obstructions. All materials must be separated from brush.

Residents must call for a special pickup as soon as they place discards at the curb or edge of pavement. It is illegal to place debris in the right-of-way without arranging for a special pickup. Residents not complying will be notified that they have 48 hours in which to call for a special pickup. After issuing the notice and no action is taken by the resident, the Town will seek legal remedy to gain compliance with the Town Code.

Each special pickup is limited to one single-axle dump truck load (about the size of a Volkswagen "Bug") per residence or nonprofit organization located in a residential zone. Each residence receives two free pickups per year. Additional pickups may be arranged at a charge of \$75.00 per load for all items except brush; additional loads of brush will be
